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**I. Introduction**

1. Pursuant to Rules 94 *bis* of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence ("Rules"), the Prosecution submits the Expert Report of Anna-Maria Radić and its accompanying annexes<sup>1</sup> and, in accordance with Rule 73(A), requests the authorization to add the above-mentioned documents to its exhibit list under Rule 65*ter* (E) (iii).

**II. Procedural Background**

2. On 7 April 2008 the Prosecution filed a Motion seeking to amend its Witness List and Exhibit List ("Motion").<sup>2</sup> The Addendum to this Motion was filed on 15 May 2008 ("Motion Addendum").<sup>3</sup> In the Motion Addendum the Prosecution requested that Anna-Maria Radić be added as a designated expert witness to partially replace the witness Ivan Grujić, whom the Prosecution no longer intends to call.<sup>4</sup>
3. The Trial Chamber found that the evidence to be presented with Anna-Maria Radić is *prima facie* relevant to the charges against the Accused and that the addition of this

witness to the list of designated experts would not unfairly prejudice the accused.<sup>5</sup> The Trial Chamber decided that it would defer its determination as to whether Anna-Maria Radić qualified as an Expert Witness pending the receipt of her Report and/or statement.<sup>6</sup>

### III. Addition of the Expert Report and of the associated exhibits to the 65 *ter* list

4. The Trial Chamber may grant leave to amend the exhibit list when it is in the interest of justice.<sup>7</sup> In determining whether the request of the applying party is in the interest of justice, the Trial Chamber may take the following factors into account:
- i. whether the proposed exhibits are relevant and have a *prima facie* probative value;<sup>8</sup>
  - ii. whether the addition of the proposed exhibits jeopardizes the right of the Accused to have adequate time and facilities to prepare a defence and to be tried without undue delay;<sup>9</sup> and
  - iii. whether a good cause for amending the exhibit list is shown.<sup>10</sup>

**A. Exhibits are relevant and probative**

**1. The Report**

5. The Radić Expert Report itself focuses upon expelled persons and refugees in the territory of the Republic of Croatia during the Indictment period.
6. In particular, the Radić Expert Report contains an analysis of:
  - i. the ethnic composition of the population, divided by geographical locations in the Republic of Croatia before the beginning of the war in 1991;
  - ii. the number and ethnicity of the expelled population and of refugees in the Republic of Croatia in various periods of time after the war broke out;
  - iii. the precise locations within the territory of the Republic of Croatia from which individuals were expelled;
  - iv. age and gender structure of the expelled persons;
  - v. the number and ethnicity of the individuals who took refuge in the Republic of Croatia from Serbia from 1991 to 1999.
7. The Radić Expert Report contains a detailed and thorough explanation of the methodology used in the collection and elaboration of relevant data.
8. Thus, the Radić Expert Report is clearly relevant and directly probative of the counts of persecution through deportation and forcible transfer (Count 1, paragraph 17 i) and deportation and forcible transfer alleged in the Third Amended Indictment (Counts 10 and 11).

**2. The annexes attached to the report**

9. The Radić Expert Report can be understood only if it is read in conjunction with its annexes, which thus constitute an integral and inseparable part of the report.
10. The annexes include:
  - i. list with the number of inhabitants in the Republic of Croatia before the war as per 1991 census divided by locations and ethnicity (ET 0643-1629-0643-1630);
  - ii. list with the number of expelled persons registered in 16 Regional Offices of the Republic of Croatia on 20 March 1992 (ET 0643-1631-0643-1631);
  - iii. list of the number of expelled persons and refugees in the republic of Croatia on 20 March 1992 (which includes: list of expelled persons and refugees registered in 16 Regional Offices of the Republic of Croatia by accommodation places; list of expelled persons and refugees registered in 16 Regional Offices of the Republic of Croatia by municipality of residence from which they were expelled; list of refugees registered in the Republic of Croatia by the republic of residence from which they took refuge; list of refugees registered in other republics of the former Yugoslavia) (ET 0643-1632-0643-1637);
  - iv. list of the number of expelled persons and refugees in the republic of Croatia on 27 March 1992 (including list of expelled persons and refugees registered in 19

- Regional Offices of the Republic of Croatia by accommodation places; list of expelled persons in the Republic of Croatia by municipality of residence from which they were expelled; list of refugees registered in the Republic of Croatia by the republic of residence from which they took refuge; list of refugees registered in other republics of the former Yugoslavia) (ET 0643-1638-0643-1644);
- v. list with the ethnicity of expelled persons as of April 1992 (ET 0643-1645-0643-1646);
  - vi. review of facilities for organized accommodation and number of accommodated persons in them during October 1992 (ET 0643-1648-0643-1657);
  - vii. statistics of expelled persons from areas of the Republic of Croatia by counties of residence before and during the expulsion (ET 0643-1647-0643-1647);
  - viii. statistics on expelled persons from areas of the Republic of Croatia occupied in 1991 by towns and municipalities before and during the expulsion (ET 0643-1658-0643-1661)
  - ix. ethnicity of expelled persons from the territories of the Republic of Croatia occupied in 1991 relative to the countries of residence before they were expelled (ET 0643-1662-0643-1662);
  - x. total statistics by residence address, age and gender of expelled persons (ET 0643-1663-0643-1695);
  - xi. list with the number of individuals who took refuge from Serbia from 1991 to 1999 and are registered in the Republic of Croatia (ET 0643-1696-0643-1699);
11. These annexes are thus also clearly relevant and directly probative of the counts of persecution through deportation and forcible transfer (Count 1, paragraph 17 i) and deportation and forcible transfer alleged in the Third Amended Indictment (Counts 10 and 11).
12. The probative value of these documents will be tested during trial. At this stage, the documents have sufficient indicia of reliability, in that they are signed, stamped or provided to the Prosecution by a reliable source, for the Trial Chamber to grant leave to add them to the exhibit list.<sup>11</sup>

## **B. The rights of the Accused are not prejudiced**

13. The Radić Expert Report and its annexes cover topics which were initially to be covered by Ivan Grujić, the witness whom Anna-Maria Radić is partially replacing. The material contained in the Radić Expert Report and annexes is more up to date, however.

14. Grujić's report and its annexes had been previously disclosed to the accused.<sup>12</sup> The Radić Expert Report and annexes were disclosed to the Accused on 13 and 14 November 2008.<sup>13</sup> The Accused has thus been aware of the general contents of the documents and of the purpose for which the Prosecution seeks to rely on them. The Accused will therefore have had sufficient time to review the proposed exhibits and to adequately prepare his defence with respect to the additional documents.

### C. Good cause


15. The Trial Chamber already granted the addition of Anna-Maria Radić to the witness list. The documents that the Prosecution seeks to admit constitute the necessary complement to the testimony of this expert witness. Indeed, Anna-Maria Radić's testimony will be based exclusively on her report and its annexes. The Prosecution has further exercised due diligence in that it received the report only recently and it disclosed the documents to the Accused upon translation into BCS of a part of the report which was in English.

16. The Prosecution has thus shown a good cause to amend the exhibit list.


### IV. Relief Requested

Name: Anna-Maria Radić.

Born on 2 September 1969 in Flörsheim, Germany. Citizen of the Republic of Croatia, resident of Zagreb.

Living since 1976 in Split, Croatia where she finished primary and secondary education. She graduated Sociology from the School of Philosophy of the University of Zagreb. Now she is in the political science postgraduate program at the Faculty of Political Sciences of the University of Zagreb.

*Previous positions:*

She worked as the journalist in the Croatian News Agency (Hina) since 1992 prior to start a career a civil servant career as the spokesperson and public relations officer in the Government's Office for Displaced Persons, Returnees and Refugees (1994–2000), than as the Head of Unit in the Department for Displaced Persons, Returnees and Refugees of the Ministry for Public Works, Reconstruction and Construction and the Ministry of Sea, Tourism, Transportation and Development dealing with international relations and return of refugees (2000-2006).

Since 2006 she is the Head of Department for Areas of Outside Areas of Special State Concern in the Directorate for Displaced, Returnees and Refugees of the Ministry of Sea, Tourism, Transportation and Development and from 2008 in the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management dealing mainly with housing of returnees to Croatia as well as international, regional and interagency cooperation related to return of refugees and post-war reconciliation.

*Current position:*

The Government of Croatia has appointed her the director of Directorate for Areas Outside Areas of Special State Concern (previously Directorate for Displaced, Returnees and Refugees) of the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management in June 2008.

Since the end of 2006 she is appointed the member of the Subcommittee on Justice, Freedom and Security and the Working Group for the preparation of accession negotiations of the Republic of Croatia with European Union for the Chapter 23. Judiciary and Fundamental Rights.

Establishment and the history of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern – former Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees**

*The Department for Areas of Special State Concern of the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management* is the legal successor of the former Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia.

It was already in the beginning of May 1991, when more frequent occurrences of the forcible expulsion of the citizens of the Republic of Croatia were reported from the then crisis areas such as Knin, Benkovac, Obrovac, Gračac and the others, in which numerous armed incidents took place at that time, when the activities were undertaken in order to provide care for them, primarily within the scope of the social welfare activities – the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare and its filed social welfare centres, the Caritas of the Bishops Conference and the Croatian Red Cross.

In order to organise and coordinate the activities of providing care and aid to a great number of expelled persons in the summer of 1991, the Government of the Republic of Croatia passed the Decree on Establishment of the *Office for Refugees of the Republic of Croatia*<sup>1</sup> within the Ministry of Labour, Social Welfare and Family. Sixteen regional offices have been established in order to immediately organise the reception and care for the refugees and the expelled persons, while the social welfare centres were the principal organisations in charge of recognizing the status and provide aid to the expelled persons.

Due to the enormous increase in the number of the expelled persons and refugees in the free territories of Croatia in the next three months – from 9,683 persons on 1<sup>st</sup> August 1991 up to more than 536,000 on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1991 which resulted in the bigger problems concerning the care for them, the Government of the Republic of Croatia, at the proposal of the Ministry of Labour, Social Welfare and Family, on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1991 passed the Decree on the Status of the Expelled Persons and Refugees and the Decree on the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees<sup>2</sup>. The Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees was set up as an individual body of the Government of the RH /Republic of Croatia/ in order to organise and coordinate the activities of providing care for the expelled persons and refugees in the Republic of Croatia. The work of the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the RH started in December and its opening was officially announced on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1991. The Office of the UN High Commission for Refugees in Croatia was opened on the same day and in the beginning they were located on the same premises as the Government Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees.

*The Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia* was set up by the Decree on the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees (“Official Gazette” no. 61/91, 71/92) which was passed by the Government of the Republic of Croatia at its session held on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1991. Its work ended on 1<sup>st</sup> June 1999 pursuant to the *Decree on Cessation of Work of the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees*, “Official Gazette” no. 54/99 of 31<sup>st</sup> May 1999.

Pursuant to the *Decree on the Internal Organisation of the Ministry of Development, Immigration and Reconstruction* (“Official Gazette” no. 74/99) of 14<sup>th</sup> July 1999, Article 3, paragraph 1, under 9, the former Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees became an administrative organisation of the *Ministry of Development, Immigration and Reconstruction* under the name of the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees*.

Pursuant to the *Decree on the Internal Organisation of the Ministry of Public Works, Reconstruction and Construction* (“Official Gazette” no. 27/00) of 8<sup>th</sup> March 2000, Article 3, paragraph 1 under 10, the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and*

*Refugees* was the administrative organisation of the new *Ministry of Public Works, Reconstruction and Construction*, which took over the employees and the archives from the former Ministry of Development, Immigration and Reconstruction. Later on, there were two more amendments to the Decree on the Internal Organisation, on 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2001 and 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2003 respectively (“Official Gazette” no. 70/01, 116/03).

Pursuant to the *Law on Organisation and Jurisdiction of the Ministries and State Administrative Organisations* (“Official Gazette” no. 199/03) of 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2003, Article 25, the work of the *Ministry of Public Works, Reconstruction and Construction* ended. Pursuant to Article 16 of the same Law, the *Ministry of the Family, Veterans’ Affairs and Intergenerational Solidarity* took over under its jurisdiction the administrative and other affairs which relate to providing care and assistance to the expelled persons, refugees and returnees for their return and the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees*, together with its employees and the archives, became the constituent part of the new *Ministry of Family, Veterans’ Affairs and Intergenerational Solidarity*.

The *Law Amending the Law on Organisation and Jurisdiction of Ministries and State Administrative Organisations* (“Official Gazette” no 30/04) of 9<sup>th</sup> March 2004, Article 11, stipulated that the *Ministry of Sea, Tourism, Transport and Development* should perform administrative and other jobs which relate to providing care and aid for the expelled persons, refugees and returnees for their return, and the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees* became the administrative organisation of that Ministry, together with the employees and archives it took over.

Pursuant to the *Law Amending the Law on Organisation and Jurisdiction of the Central Bodies of the State Administration* (“Official Gazette” No. 5/2008) of 11<sup>th</sup> January 2008, the new *Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management* was established and the administrative and other affairs which relate to providing care and assistance to the expelled persons, refugees and returnees for their return were transferred under its jurisdiction and the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees* became the administrative organisation of that Ministry, together with the employees and the archives that were taken over. Pursuant to the *Decree on the Internal Organisation of the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management* (“Official Gazette” no, 34/2008) of 19<sup>th</sup> March

2008, the *Department for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees* changed its name into the *Department for Areas of Special State Concern*, retaining under its jurisdiction, inter alia, the matters which relate to providing care for the expelled persons and refugees and their return.

### **3. Jurisdiction of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern<sup>3</sup>**

The jurisdiction of the Department as the legal successor of the former Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia has been expanded from the elementary tasks of reception and providing basic care for the expelled persons and refugees in the first half of 1990 to the jobs related to the return of the expelled persons and refugees which started as of mid 90's. Those jobs have been expanded in the mid-1990 by passing the adequate legal provisions and sub-laws concerning the organisation and support to the return of the expelled persons and refugees.

Immediately after it was set up at the very end of 1991, the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees took over the responsibility for the accommodation of the expelled persons, for the construction and additional construction works on the accommodation facilities, for collection, transportation and distribution of the humanitarian aid, for financing the accommodation and organising the overall welfare for the expelled persons and refugees as well as for gathering information on the expelled persons and verifying the status of the expelled persons. The Office coordinates with all subjects in Croatia who take part in providing care for the expelled persons and refugees and with numerous international governmental and non-governmental humanitarian organisations, among which with the UN High Commission for Refugees in the first place. The main task of the Office is to provide care for the expelled persons and refugees, that is, to organise their accommodation

Until 1995, that is, when *en masse* return of population started within Croatia and over its borders in both directions, the main activity of the Department was related to the above-mentioned activities concerning the reception and care for a large number of expelled persons and refugees, but afterwards it has been directed to the return of the expelled persons and refugees and dealing with the consequences of war in those areas in Croatia which were affected by the war and that for four years were out of the constitutional and juridical system of the Republic of Croatia.

The main groups of the tasks the Department is in charge of are the following:

- to organise welfare and provide the expelled persons, returnees and refugees with care pursuant to the Law on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees, including the decision-making on the status of such persons, the organised accommodation and providing various kinds of financial support to the persons having such status;
- the return of the expelled persons to their homes in the Republic of Croatia;
- the return of those refugees who were staying abroad to the Republic of Croatia – across-the-border return;
- the implementation of the programme of return of the refugees to the countries formed after the break-up of the former SFRJ /Socialist Federative Republic of Yugoslavia/ which, primarily, relates to providing support to the return to Bosnia and Herzegovina;
- the restitution of the occupied property to its owners;
- the housing accommodation in the areas of special state concern (hereinafter PPDS) in order to ensure that the population will return, stay and settle in those areas;
- the housing accommodation for the former holders of tenancy rights outside of the PPDS for the refugees who are returning to the Republic of Croatia;
- management and control of the state housing fund in the PPDS;
- coordination of local and international programmes for the return of the expelled persons and refugees;

- taking and initiating the necessary measures and activities in order to improve the process of return and the operative implementation and coordination of the Government programmes of return with other responsible bodies who take part in the process of return of the expelled persons and refugees.

The jurisdiction of the Department for the Areas of Special State Concern has been precisely defined in the last Decree on the Organisation of the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management from March of this year, according to which the Department shall perform the activities related to: defining the national policy of return of the expelled persons and refugees and the stay and settling of population in the areas of special state concern, implementing and coordinating in an operative manner the Government programmes of housing accommodation and return with other bodies that take part in the implementation of the programmes, performing administrative and professional jobs relating to: enforcing of regulations on housing accommodation in the areas of special state concern and outside of them, on the expelled persons, returnees and refugees, on the return of the expelled persons and refugees; managing and handling the state property provided for the housing accommodation in the areas of special state concern and outside of them; concluding contracts on the lease of state property, sales contracts and contracts on donating the state building land, on donating the basic construction material, apartments and houses owned by the state; concluding the deals with the owners and beneficiaries on the compensations for the suffered damage; implementing the international agreements and contracts on the return of refugees; implementing the programme of assistance of the Government of the Republic of Croatia for the return of the Croats to the states formed after the break-up of the former SFRJ; cooperates with local and foreign governmental and non-governmental institutions and organisations regarding the return, the restitution of property and providing the housing accommodation; organising welfare for the expelled persons, returnees and refugees, care for the old and feeble expelled persons, returnees and refugees in special need; setting up and updating the central databases; managing and governing the state property for housing accommodation and other donated property; proposing regulations from the jurisdiction of the Department; reporting to the competent bodies and the public on its

work; organising the care for those persons who left their residence due to natural disasters.<sup>4</sup>

### **3. Organisation of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern**

The Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees was set up pursuant to the Decree of the Government of the Republic of Croatia at the very end of 1991 and it was constituted in the next three months, immediately taking over the duty of emergency care and accommodation of the large number of the expelled persons who took refuge from the areas of the Republic of Croatia affected by the war and occupied.

In order to perform those tasks, the following organisational units were set up:

1. Accommodation Section;
2. Section for Health Care and Psychosocial Assistance;
3. Section for Humanitarian Aid;
4. Section for Cooperation with International Humanitarian Organisations;
5. Section for Coordination of Regional Offices;
6. Legal Section and Registry;
7. Information Section;
8. Analytical Section;
9. Financial Section.

In addition to the organisational units of the central Office in Zagreb, sixteen regional offices for expelled persons and refugees were initially set up in the towns in the free territories of Croatia where a large number of expelled persons were accommodated – in the county centres. By the end of 1992, five more regional offices were set up. The regional offices have been responsible for the operative tasks of providing accommodation and food, organising and distributing the humanitarian aid and recognising of the status of the expelled persons in the field. The regional offices, inter alia, every month verify the cards of the expelled persons with the status, register and deregister the status, and effectuate payments of the financial support to the refugees.

They continued to perform a part of their jobs through the social welfare centres - there were around 90 of them - in all towns and municipalities in the free territory, thus covering the entire free territory of the Republic of Croatia. A part of the employees of the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees were employed in the social welfare centres and they performed the jobs of providing care for the expelled persons. By the end of 1992, there were around 250 employees performing the jobs of providing care for the expelled persons and refugees, out of which 160 were in the regional offices and social welfare centres.

The organisation of the Office and later of the Department has changed in time, adjusting to the new requirements and tasks, but retaining the majority of the basic functions and organisational units from the previous Governmental Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees.

When the return of the expelled persons to the liberated areas of the Republic of Croatia started at the end of 1995, new branch offices of the Office were set up in the then liberated areas in Knin and Korenica, and in 14 social welfare centres and part of the regional offices were closed. In March 1996, the work of three out of 21 regional offices (Zlata Bistrica, Čakovec and Koprivnica) ceased due to the decrease in number of the expelled persons and refugees in those areas owing to the fact that the process of return has started. The coordination of tasks in relation to providing care of the remaining expelled persons and refugees in the areas where those three regional offices were closed were taken over by the Regional Office in Varaždin.

As of the end of the 90's, the task of providing care for the expelled persons and refugees and their return has been completely organised through the regional offices, and it has been completely separated from the system of the social welfare centres.

The following organisational units have been set up to perform the tasks of the present Department for the Areas of Special State Concern:

- Sector for Housing Accommodation, comprising the following sections:  
Section for Housing Accommodation in the Areas of Special State Concern,  
Section for Housing Accommodation Outside of the Areas of Special State Concern and Implementation of the International Programmes, Section for

Monitoring and Analysis, which manages and maintains the database of the Department;

- Sector for Managing the State Property from the Jurisdiction of the Ministry and the Property and Legal Affairs, comprising the following sections: Section for Status Rights and Property and Legal Matters and the Section for Managing the State Property from the Jurisdiction of the Ministry;
- Sector for Coordination of Regional Offices, comprising the following sections: Section for Coordination of Regional Offices and the Section for Programmes of Social and Economic Revival.

In addition to the central office in Zagreb, there are presently 10 offices within the Department which cover the areas of the counties and municipalities and towns in the entire territory of the RH. The regional offices are responsible for the operative tasks in the PPDS /Areas of Special State Concern/ and outside of them that relate to the housing accommodation, care for the expelled persons, returnees and refugees and their return, the restitution of property and management and control over the apartments and houses in the state ownership. The seats of the regional offices are in Karlovac, Gospić, Osijek, Pakrac, Petrinja, Slavonski Brod, Knin, Vukovar, Zadar and Zagreb. Besides, fifteen other field branch offices have been organised in order to cover all the areas of return of the expelled persons and refugees.

Regional offices perform professional and administrative jobs concerning the resolution of legal status of expelled persons, returnees and refugees; they issue documents with which they prove their legal status /and/ on the basis of which they exercise statutory rights; organize and control providing of care and presence of persons in facilities of organized accommodation, take care of property in facilities of organized accommodation, facilitate removal from facilities of organized accommodation, validate personal identity cards, operationally implement procedures related to the return of persons; operationally participate in selling and donating of state-owned dwellings; operationally implement programmes of economic and social development of the areas of special state concern; operationally implement procedures related to housing accommodation in the areas of special state concern and outside the areas of special state concern; issue first-instance decisions; receive and complete requests for restitution of property temporarily given in possession and for use;

receive and complete requests; receive documents for the purpose of amending the case.

## **5. Legal Basis of Status of Displaced Persons and Refugees and Returnees**

Means of achieving the status of displaced person and refugee and social rights that persons having the said status may be granted are defined in several basic laws and sub-laws:

- Law on Status of Displaced Persons and Refugees (“Official Gazette” no. 96/93, 39/95, 29/99 and 128/99) as basic law defining the social welfare of expelled persons, returnees and refugees – their status and rights.
- International Instruments on Status of Refugees as basic regulations defining the rights of refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina and Serbia in Croatia – institute of temporary protection.
- Rules on Revision of Personal Identity Cards of Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees (“Official Gazette”, no. 94/96).

For the purpose of defining the status of internal refugees in the Republic of Croatia – expelled persons, the Decree on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees was firstly passed in 1991 and then the Law regulating the status of expelled persons in 1993. The status and rights of refugees from other countries who found refuge in Croatia are defined in accordance with international documents on refugees.

Legal regulations regulating means of losing the status of expelled person and refugee, and acquiring and losing the status of returnee and other social rights which they may exercise are as follows:

- Law on Status of Displaced Persons and Refugees (“Official Gazette”, no. 96/93, 39/95, 29/99 and 128/99),
- Agreement of Working Group on Return Operational Procedures (“Official Gazette” no. 92/98)
- Programme for Return and Care for Expelled Persons, Refugees and Displaced Persons (“Official Gazette”, no. 92/98),

- Decree on Entitlements of Returnees (“Official Gazette”, no. 25/96, 33/97, 69/97),
- Law on Reconstruction (“Official Gazette”, no. 24/96, 54/96, 87/96 and 57/00) as basic law regulating the right to reconstruction due to the return and existing methods of reconstruction,
- Law on Areas of Special State Concern (“Official Gazette”, no. 86/08) – as basic law regulating the right and models of housing accommodation in the areas of special state concern, more precisely, in the areas that were struck by direct war operations and destructions,
- Conclusion on modus of housing accommodation for returnees who are not owners of the house or flat, but who lived in socially-owned flats (former tenancy right holders) in the areas of the Republic of Croatia that are outside the areas of special state concern (“Official Gazette”, no. 100/2003, 179/2004 and 79/2005), and Decision on Implementation of Housing Accommodation for Returnees – former tenancy right holders for flats outside the areas of special state concern (“Official Gazette”, no. 63/2008),
- Law on Temporary Take-Over and Use of Certain Property (“Official Gazette”, no. 73/95, 7/96, 100/97),
- Law on Lease of Flats in Liberated Areas (“Official Gazette”, no. 73/95).

Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management is entrusted with the implementation of all said regulations related to the welfare of expelled persons and refugees and securing conditions for their return, programme of reconstruction and housing accommodation.

Expelled persons, returnees and refugees exercise essential social rights through the system of basic welfare and accommodation, which is stipulated by the Law on Status of Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees and financed from the budget. Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management, more precisely, its Administration for Areas of Special State Concern (until 1999 Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia) is entrusted with direct organization of that system. This body is entrusted with the recognition of the status of expelled person, refugee and returnee and granting entitlements to persons in accordance with the Law on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees, the revision of entitlements to organized accommodation, meeting of expenses for organized

accommodation and payment of financial support to persons in status. Pursuant to the regulations on internal organization of the Ministry, this Administration is also entrusted with establishing entitlement to housing accommodation and the Administration for Reconstruction of the Ministry, more precisely, state *Agencija za pravni promet i posredovanje nekretninama* for buying flats and houses for housing accommodation is entrusted with the technical implementation of housing accommodation method, which includes construction of residential buildings and delivery of construction material.

The Law on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees adopted already in 1993 is basic law regulating the status of expelled persons and refugees from the Republic of Croatia and since the time of legal amendments of 1999 also the status of returnees, then the procedure for acquiring the status of expelled person, refugees and returnees, and their entitlements. The Law on Amendments to the Law on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees (NN /"Official Gazette" 128/99) of November 1999 regulates for the first time the status and entitlements of returnees and requirements for acquiring and losing the status of expelled person and refugee as well as requirements for acquiring and losing the status of returnees who were previously defined by Government's decrees of temporary nature since 1995, and since 1997 and 1998 by the Agreement of Working Group on Return Operational Procedures and Programme for Return and Welfare of Expelled Persons, Refugees and Displaced Persons.

As per the Law on Status of Expelled Persons and Refugees, **an expelled person** is a person who left their place of residence from one area of the Republic of Croatia, endangered by war, in order to avoid immediate threat for life caused by the aggression and other war activities and who found refuge in another place in the Republic of Croatia. As per the Law, a refugee is a citizen of the Republic of Croatia who fled from the occupied and crisis areas of the Republic of Croatia for the mentioned reasons and found a temporary accommodation outside the borders of the Republic of Croatia.

**A returnee** is an expelled person or a refugee who returns to their place of residence, more precisely, to the Republic of Croatia. It is defined that returnee status may last for a maximum of six months counting from the date of the return. Persons having the

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returnee status enjoy the same entitlements as persons having the status of expelled person. Regardless of conditions and time of the return, all returnees enjoy the same entitlements as to the status, exercising their rights and acquiring the status.

The status and the entitlements of the refugees from Bosnia and Herzegovina and Serbia and Montenegro who sought refuge in the Republic of Croatia after 1991 have been regulated in an appropriate way by implementing the 1951 Geneva Convention and the 1967 UN Protocol on the Status of the Refugees, as well as further to Law on Movement and Residence of Aliens (NN /Official Gazette/ No. 53/91).

**A refugee** is a person who, due to a reasonable threat to his/her life, due to war threats or due to different forms of discrimination left the country of his/her nationality seeking refuge in another country. In Croatia, these persons are the ones who fled Bosnia and Herzegovina, and, to a lesser extent, Serbia and Kosovo. Up until 1997 there existed a status of a **refugee in transit**, as an interim refugee status that lasted up to three months and which could have been extended as appropriate. This status was awarded to those persons who found temporary refuge in Croatia, the closest neighbouring country, after they had fled the country of their origin due to justified fear for and threat to their lives, on their way to third countries for which they had already acquired necessary entry documents (such as visas or other documents enabling them to enter those countries).

The 1999 amendments to the Law on Expelled Persons and Refugees stipulate that not a single person can acquire the status of an expelled person and refugee as there are not war threatened areas in the Republic of Croatia any more.

Expelled persons and returnees shall be entitled to reimbursement of accommodation expenses: to an organised accommodation or to cash refund in case they are in private accommodation; if they have no income they shall be entitled to cash payment, to remuneration of transport expenses, as well as to refund of any relocation or return costs and fees, the costs of funerals and exhumations, as set forth in the Law on Status of Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees. In addition, the Law prescribes any such other entitlements that are realised through other systems of social welfare, such as the right to children education, health care and all the rest that has been defined in detail in other relevant legislation. Since 2001, the money payable to expelled persons

and refugees is equal to the one paid within the system of social welfare of the Republic of Croatia. The same entitlements, except for the right to a cash payment, are due to *refugees* as well, until any such time when the conditions are secured for their return to BiH /Bosnia and Herzegovina/, or until they acquire Croatian nationality.

Expelled persons and refugees returning to their homes in Croatia are entitled to the rights under the *Status of Returnees*, which is limited to a six-month period after their return, for the purpose of helping them to reintegrate and ensuring them minimum resources until any such time they secure their own means of subsistence. This special type of social welfare for the returnees for the period immediately following their return is a significant measure meant for creating the conditions for the return to be possible. Persons entitled to these entitlements further to their status of expelled persons or returnees or refugees do not qualify for the social welfare entitlements. After having ceased to be in the status of the returnees, i.e. upon expiration of the six-month period, socially deprived persons may be entitled to an aid as a part of the social welfare system further to Law on Social Welfare. This primarily implies subsistence assistance within the social welfare system as a complementary form of a returnees' remuneration, as well as other forms of aid.

## **COLLECTING THE DATA ON THE EXPELLED PERSONS AND REFUGEES**

### **6. The Data Source**

The data on the expelled persons and refugees during the first half of the nineties were provided by the Department for the Areas of the Special State Concern of the Ministry for Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management, which is a legal successor to the former Office for the Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia.

Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees established and kept the records on all persons registered as refugees and expelled persons in the Republic of Croatia. The data on the expelled persons and refugees have been collected by way of registering the persons that fall into category of expelled persons and refugees – the first

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registration of expelled people took place in March 1992, whereas the refugees were first registered a year later, in April 1993.

The new registration of expelled persons and refugees was carried out from May 31<sup>st</sup> to June 21<sup>st</sup> 1994; central database was then established for the first time, based on that particular registration; the database contained all the data on all the expelled persons, returnees and refugees; the data were saved in electronic form. Due to extensive fluctuations during the following three years, all the expelled persons, returnees and refugees were re-registered in 1997. Ever since, this database has been subject to permanent revisions, as new data have been entered based on new entrants and departers in the expelled persons and refugees population in the territory of the Republic of Croatia, as well as due to changes of data pertaining to those expelled persons and refugees that had already been registered (change of address, type of accommodation, place of residence).

In this way, we have at our disposal relevant data on demographic, familiar, educational and socio-economic features of the expelled persons and refugees settled in Croatia. For each individual person we have 70 to 80 different facts pertaining to his/her personal information, place of origin, date of flight, current address in the Republic of Croatia, members of his/her family, occupation, vocational status, property status and plight during the war. Data contained in central database contain personal files kept for each individual registered person; they are stored in the Department's archives.

## **7. Data Collection Methodology**

At the times of the most intensive exodus of the Croatian population from the territory of the Republic of Croatia beset by the war since the end of 1991, the social welfare field centres of the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare organised the reception of the expelled persons, registering them officially at the same time. The reports on thus registered expelled persons were thereupon submitted to a responsible Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare, which established the inventory list of the expelled population, based on manually collected data. On the account of a huge number of the expelled persons in a relatively short period, only a portion of expelled persons were

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officially registered by the end of 1991, so that the data on a total number of the expelled persons were partially based on estimates.

The Office for the Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia was established at the very end of 1991; its administration, which undertook to organise the reception and accommodation of the expelled persons and to keep the official records, was established during the first three months of 1992.

According to initial data contained in the archives of the Office for the Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare, the total number of the expelled persons in the Republic of Croatia amounted to 340,000 in March 1992 (data collected by 19 regional offices for the expelled persons and refugees – incomplete data). The data quoted hereinabove were collected through local regional offices for expelled persons and refugees established with the county centres as well as through the centres for social welfare that were in charge of the reception of the expelled population, organising their reception and accommodation in the free territory of the Republic of Croatia. Thus gathered data were statistically processed by the then Office for the Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Government of the Republic of Croatia.

The precise data on the expelled persons, and subsequently on refugees as well, have been determined based on several registrations of the expelled persons and refugees, at the time when all these persons were granted status of expelled persons and refugees and when necessary documents were collected for each individual person.

Due to extensive fluctuations in numbers of expelled persons and refugees since 1991 up until to date, which could not be properly recorded in different periods due to exceptional mobility of the said population, several registrations and re-registrations of expelled persons and refugees were carried out as follows:

- 1) Registration of expelled persons in April 1992 – the result: 247,278 expelled persons;
- 2) Registration of refugees in March 1993 – the result: 269,005 refugees from BiH;

- 3) Registration of expelled persons and refugees in June 1994 – the result: 196,870 expelled persons and 183,038 refugees from BiH (5% of them were not registered);
- 4) Re-registration of expelled persons, returnees and refugees in March/April 1997.

The very first precise data on the exact number of the expelled persons were established in April 1992, after the first registration of the expelled persons that left the territory of Croatia beset by the war, seeking refuge in other, more secure areas of Croatia, had taken place. On the occasion, 247,278 expelled persons were issued with the Personal Expelled Person's Cards. The aforementioned number of expelled persons included the population from the bordering free territory of the Republic of Croatia driven out of their homes due to the lasting shelling of the settlements and the towns next to a separation line, as well as those people whose homes were destroyed as a result.

Ever since, the data may be systematically followed up, despite the fact that the calculations were made manually (at the time there was no electronic support available for entering the data into computers) and that they were gathered through the centres for social welfare and the regional offices for expelled persons and refugees. In the course of registration, the expelled persons were issued with the expelled persons cards; these cards had to be validated on a monthly basis by a competent centre for social welfare and regional offices, thus enabling us to continually monitor their number.

It has always been difficult to determine the exact number of those persons who fled Croatia and left for foreign countries; the reason was the non-existence of a precise inventory, as well as their brief stay abroad – according to data gathered from the countries of their destination, there were at least 150,000 refugees from Croatia in December 1991. Most of them returned to Croatia during 1992; around 50,000 refugees stayed abroad (an estimate made in 1995).

We do not have individual data on the expelled persons and refugees in the Department's archives for 1992 and 1993. Individual data on registered persons were kept and stored with the regional field offices and centres for social welfare. The

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documentation referring to that period is incomplete and it was statistically calculated based on the reports submitted by the local centres for social welfare, which in turn submitted to the Office the statistical data only. At the time, Croatia was facing a massive exodus of people who crossed Bosnia and Herzegovina border and entered the Republic of Croatia; at the same time, large portions of the Croatian territory were overrun and exposed to artillery attacks so that it was hardly practicable to ensure accurate recording of the movement of the refugees in the Republic of Croatia. An attempt to establish central database using data collected through the registration of the expelled persons in 1992, i.e. the refugees in 1993, failed due to the situation in the Republic of Croatia hereinabove described, when the towns next to separation lines were exposed to bombardment and electricity cuts all through the end of 1993 and there was not sufficient technical equipment in the field (the lack of computers).

Identification file for each person, which acquired /sic/ the status, was established only in 1994, on the basis of the registration, at that time advisory and financially supported by the UNHCR. Based on those subsequently gathered information according to the testimonies of the expelled persons and refugees registered in 1994, it was possible to establish their origin, date of taking refuge and movement.

Registration conducted in 1994, re-established the rights of each person to a status of expelled person, returnee or refugee.

During the re-registration in 1994, individual personal files with the record of registration were open for all persons with a confirmed status of expelled person or a refugee, listing personal information and other gathered documents. The Department Archives keeps these individual files for each registered expelled person, returnee and refugee. About 70 to 80 relevant pieces of information referring to personal information, place of origin (residence before taking refuge), date of expulsion, temporary addresses, family members, occupation, employment, property, war-suffering etcetera, were collected for each person with a status of expelled person and refugee.

All records and documents relating to change of information on accommodation of the person, the status of the person or other relevant information for extension or termination of the status of the expelled person including the requests for return,

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reconstruction and similar, and information and documents gathered in re-registration of 1997, were additionally added to those individual files. Information on changes, requests and other information on expelled persons, refugees and returnees are gathered through authorized regional offices and welfare centres which the persons contact directly in the field, after which they are entered into the central database in Zagreb office for further processing and determination of the basis of their rights.

## **8. Administration Central Database**

In the central database, the Administration for Areas of Special State Concern keeps records on all the persons registered as expelled persons, and refugees in Croatia.

The growth of the Central Information System of the Administration for Areas of Special State Concern of the Ministry for Regional Development and Forestry, earlier Office, that is, Administration for Expelled Persons, Returnees and Refugees began in 1994, when the donations procured funds to conduct registration of expelled persons and refugees. Donations of the UNHCR provided for the equipment and work on complete list. Equipment provided was a technological trend at the time and it included Unix server by the manufacturer Hewlett Packard, database and tools of the English manufacturer Recital.

The existing central database on all the expelled persons, returnees and refugees was developed on field registrations of the expelled persons and refugees conducted between 31 May and 21 June 1994. Regional field offices and welfare centres filled up appropriate questionnaires with basic information on each listed person with a status of expelled person or a refugee. Information collected was submitted to the central office in Zagreb and entered in the central database. Input and processing of collected information was finished by the end of September 1994.

As of March 1995, the database is subject to constant changes due to regular input of information on new applications and cancelled registrations of the expelled persons and refugees on the entire territory of Croatia and changes of information of already registered expelled persons and refugees (changes of address, type of accommodation, and place of residence). Since end of April 1996 information is updated two times per

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month in order to reduce backlog in relation to the current situation. Due to central input and processing of information, information in the central database is about a month behind the current situation in the field.

Central database on expelled persons and refugees was reconstructed and upgraded with information gathered in the course of re-registration of expelled persons and refugees conducted in March and April 1997. The mentioned re-registration was conducted on account of significant changes, which occurred after 1994 in connection to the return of big groups of expelled persons and refugees to their homes in the meantime and new regulations regarding the status of the returnees. Central information system was carefully upgraded with information on the return of expelled persons and refugees. At that time, additional information on each re-registered expelled person or refugee was gathered.

As a result, we have relevant information on demographic, family, educational, social, and economic characteristics of expelled persons and refugees taken care of in Croatia. Seventy to eighty relevant pieces of information have been entered for each expelled person and a refugee: their personal information, place of origin (residence before taking refuge), date of refuge, temporary address, family members, occupation, employment, property, war-suffering etcetera.

The mentioned information in the central database was based on personal files of each registered expelled person, returnee and refugee stored in the archives of the Administration. Individual files include all documents collected in the field during the registration and re-registration and all subsequent changes.

System of daily monitoring and changing of information in the central database was introduced after the re-registration in 1997. Central database is updated with information concerning the status of each individual up to a present day.

Information about the requests and other information concerning the expelled persons, refugees and returnees are gathered through the authorised regional offices and welfare centres to which the persons having the status and the applicants address directly in the field. The Office in Zagreb then enters information into the central database. Parallel with the re-registration, the Office has moved from cash payment of

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regular monthly entitlements to the expelled persons, returnees and refugees through the regional offices and welfare centres (cash desk), to the payment on family savings accounts. By re-registration processing of information about the entitlements of the persons with a status to monthly financial support, is linked with the central database through which the entitlements to financial support for each persons are established on monthly basis. During 1997 processing of all other rights of the expelled persons, returnees and refugees, obtaining and termination of the status, were organised through the central database. Daily revision of the status of all expelled persons, returnees and refugees is conducted based on information submitted by regional offices and other the state administration bodies. The requests for the return of displaced persons and Croatian refugees from foreign countries to the Republic of Croatia and establishing of their rights are processed in the same manner; information on requests for reconstruction and requests for housing accommodation, respective decisions and all relevant information on the applicants were gradually updated.

Soon after the work on re-registration of expelled persons, returnees and refugees has finished, came the request for computer support of payments to the persons having a status and afterwards the requests for regular keeping of all information obtained through these listings.

In the following years programme support for collecting, processing and keeping of information files on refugees and expelled persons was developed, database and program solutions for payments which are being made even today, program solutions for the requirements of the UNHCR, Welfare Centres, Regional Offices and many additional program solutions in different fields of activity of the Administration, from re-registration of expelled persons and refugees, housing accommodation, allocation of donations, reconstruction of buildings, to registration of returnees, managing of reconstruction etcetera. In recent times, due to the requirements of registration and managing of state-owned housing facilities, program solutions have been partially implemented. Since the requests were constantly changing throughout the entire work of the Administration, it would be hard to number all the activities the Administration participated in the last three and such a various activities could have only been conducted with well established information system of the Administration.

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In the period between 1994 and 2000 various donations (UNHCR, USAID) provided for the equipment of the central system and communication infrastructure which connected all Regional Offices, pertaining branch-offices and Welfare Centres with centrally located Administration.

At the moment there are hundred vacancies in the Administration, in the central office in Zagreb and regional offices connected according to the central system and server system composed of three HP-UX RISC computers (one with the 4 PA-RISC processor).

Entire central information system of the Administration is set up on Recital base and to some extent on Microsoft SQL basis. Transition from Unix platform, technologically outdated basis on which the current database is set up, to technologically more advanced relation database is in progress.

Computer support for the entire work of the Administration is provided through the central database, so regular keeping and input of information about the status of each person and requests are of strategic importance for the work of the Administration. Since 2000, all regional offices each day have an insight into all information changes in the central database, as they were properly connected with the central administration. Besides, for some years past they have a possibility to enter the changes in the central database, related to information under their responsibility (first-instance bodies).

Central database of the Administration has records on 735,000 persons registered from 1994 as expelled persons, returnees or refugees (220,000 expelled persons, 390,000 refugees and 125,000 returnees)<sup>5</sup>. Most of the registered persons do not have an active status any more, as meanwhile they returned to their homes and exhausted their rights based on their status of returnees, expelled person or refugee.

In relation to the status of expelled persons, returnees and refugees, we keep the following records in the central data base:

1. Programme for records and data on expelled persons, returnees and refugees
  - 1.1. records of personal charts of expelled persons, returnees and refugees;
  - 1.2. records of family charts of refugees;
  - 1.3. follow up and recording of changes in accommodation of expelled persons, returnees and refugees;
  - 1.4. recording of changes in personal identification data;
  - 1.5. recording of changes of stand-in family *Inositelj obiteljil /* separation of families;
  - 1.6. recording of temporary residence of persons;
  - 1.7. printout, review of personal charts;
  - 1.8. recording of changes in status of expelled persons, and
  - 1.9. compilation of reports and statistics.
  
2. Programme for records and data on payments made to expelled persons, returnees and refugees
  - 2.1. family financial charts;
  - 2.2. search of payments by all ordered parameters;
  - 2.3. changes in relation to payments;
  - 2.4. changes in payments;
  - 2.5. changes of financial holder of payments;
  - 2.6. records of bank books;
  - 2.7. activation – deactivation of bank books;
  - 2.8. following up of payment orders, halting of payment orders;
  - 2.9. analysis of orders; processing of returned orders;
  - 2.10. processing of consents for entering orders returned to the UPI /Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees/;
  - 2.11. cancellation of payments as per loss of status;
  - 2.12. cancellation of payments as per money support/ maintenance;
  - 2.13. keeping all other data in relation to payments to expelled persons / refugees;

- 2.14. effectuate monthly payments, lists and statistics for money compensations;
- 2.15. records of measuring points, electricity meters for expelled persons in private accommodation, and
- 2.16. effectuate monthly payments for the costs of electricity in private accommodation.

Based on the data submitted by regional offices and other bodies of state administration, all changes which happened in relation to the status of each group of expelled persons and refugees from 1997 till now are entered into the central data base on a daily bases and are kept up-to-date. The remaining number of active expelled persons, returnees and refugees is very small at the moment because most of them returned to their houses in the meantime and exhausted the rights on the basis of the status.

## **DATA ON EXPELLED POPULATION OF THE REPUBLIC OF CROATIA**

### **9. Analysis of the ethnic composition of the population before the war as per 1991 Census**

From the territory of the Republic of Croatia which was occupied in 1991 and that was not the part of the constitutional and legal system of the Republic of Croatia, the entire non-Serb population was expelled.

The UN forces - UNPROFOR - established the control over these territories of the Republic of Croatia on 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992. Four UN zones were set up. Later on, the so-called pink zones were also created which included the areas on the lines of disengagement.

The territories of the former UNPA Sectors East, North and South were entirely occupied and under Serbian control of the so-called Krajina and Serbian Autonomous District of Slavonia, Baranja and Western Sirmium (Srem). The territory of the former Sector West included also the territory of Novska, Nova Gradiška, Daruvar, Grubišno Polje and Pakrac municipality (the municipalities are listed according to old

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administrative nomenclature) out of which more than a half of the territory was under the control of the Croatian authorities even before 1<sup>st</sup> May 1995, that is, before Croatian military and police operation Flash.

According to the data of the 1991 Census in the RH (The Republic Institute for Statistics) out of 4,784,265 citizens of the Republic of Croatia 78.10% were Croats, 12.16% Serbs and 9.75% citizens of other nationalities.

According to the RH Census in 1991, that is, right before the beginning of the war in Croatia, in the then occupied territories and afterwards UNPA and “pink” zones lived:

In the occupied territories (former Sectors East, North and South) as well as in the Sector West which was in part occupied, in 1991 lived 528,639 citizens, out of which 187,530 were Croats, 72,467 other non-Serb citizens and 268,642 Serbs.

Attached is the table chart with the exact overview of the municipalities and towns which were occupied or were situated directly at the lines of disengagement. The population numbers in the occupied territories differ from the above mentioned division according to the UNPA zones due to the different administrative structure of towns and municipalities; thus for the territory in the Sector West the table contains only information regarding settlements which were occupied in 1991. The table in the attachment gives a precise population overview in these territories in 1991, before the war broke out: in total there lived 542,650 citizens out of which there were 214,621 Croats, 270,756 Serbs and 56,910 citizens of other nationalities.

From the territories of the Republic of Croatia which were occupied in 1991 almost the entire Croatian and other non-Serb population was expelled. The majority of them were accommodated in Croatia, while a part of expelled persons, for example the Hungarians, were for the most part received in Hungary. This clearly shows that the principle criterion for the expulsion was one's nationality, that is, whether one belongs to Serbian population or not.

From the occupied Croatian territories around 220,000 non-Serbs were expelled, along with 30,000 citizens from the areas of lines of disengagement – 220,000 had the status of the expelled persons in the free territories of the Republic of Croatia and around another 56,000 citizens in the third countries.

#### **10. Preliminary statistics on the expelled population of the Republic of Croatia in 1991.**

During the biggest expulsion of the Croatian population from the territory of the Republic of Croatia which happened during the war starting in the summer and lasting till the end of 1991, first admissions of expelled persons in the free territories of Croatia were organised by the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare through its regional social welfare centres which already existed in each municipality of the Republic of Croatia.

First expulsions of the Croatian citizens started in the spring of 1991. On 1<sup>st</sup> August 1994, the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare had in its register 9,638 expelled persons, but the actual number is estimated to be around 30,000, out of which a part of them left for foreign countries. There were 125,000 expelled persons and refugees who were forced to leave their homes in August, 230,000 in September, 400,000 in October and 500,000 in November of 1991.

As it has been already described in the chapter titled *The Methodology of Data Collecting* of this report, the information collected at the time is not precise because it was processed manually and a system for determining the precise number of the expelled persons was established only in the spring of 1992.

Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare informed the public on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 1991, that according to its estimation, 320,000 Croatian citizens had to leave their homes and became expelled persons. Out of this number, 157,000 were received in Croatia, 30,000 had not been registered in the admissions centres, 66,000 left Croatia and went to Serbia, 15,000 went to Bosnia and Herzegovina, 22,000 to Slovenia, 35,000 were registered in Hungary and 4,000 in Czechoslovakia.

Till 26<sup>th</sup> November 1991, 500,000 citizens had to leave their homes in crisis or occupied areas and became expelled persons or refugees. This represents 11.6% of the Croatian population. According to the information of the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare, 225,222 expelled persons (90,303 families) were accommodated, out of which 71,353 (31,612 families) in the Zagreb area. It needs to be added to this number around 50,000 expelled persons who were not officially registered. There were many people who fled from bombs and found temporary shelters with their relatives and friends. A large number of refugees left for foreign countries; 21,671 refugees were registered in Slovenia (plus 10,000 who did not register), around 58,000 in Bosnia and Herzegovina, 4,000 in Austria, 5,000 in Germany, 45,000 in Hungary, 1,000 in Italy and 1,843 in Czechoslovakia (1,340 in the Czech Republic and 503 in Slovakia).

By 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1991 when the Office for Expelled Persons was established, there were already around 500,000 expelled persons, in January 1992 the number went up to 650,000 expelled persons, that included the Croatian refugees in foreign countries who were received either in families or in organised shelters such as hotels, sport halls, readjusted barracks, social welfare and educational institutions, huts, recreational facilities, and also, in numerous settlements for expelled persons which had been built in the mean time.

According to the first information collected in 16 regional offices for expelled persons and refugees from the archives of the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the

Government of the Republic of Croatia, in March of 1992, the number of expelled persons in the Republic of Croatia was 335,792. The information was collected through local social welfare centres which received the expelled population and organised their admission and accommodation in the free territories of the Republic of Croatia while the Office for Expelled Persons of the Government of the Republic of Croatia monitored only the numerical data. Thus this is again incomplete information, because the systematic monitoring of the numbers of the expelled persons had not been set up yet, the expelled persons had not received the expelled persons' card which they would have to attest each month. The regional offices were still in the process of being organized, and at the same time there was a big fluctuation of the expelled persons.

This information comes from times when the return of the expelled persons to the cities in the separation line zones (Osijek, Vinkovci, Sisak, Karlovac, Zadar, Šibenik, Nova Gradiška and others) already started and after the Sarajevo Cease Fire Agreement dated 15.01.1992 which ensured temporary cease fire in big cities of the free territories of the Republic of Croatia.

First precise information about the number of the expelled persons was determined in April 1992 after the registration of 247,278 expelled persons who received at the moment of registration personal expelled persons' cards. This number includes the population from the occupied territories of the Republic of Croatia, settlements

bordering with the separation line zones which could not return to their homes because they were demolished due to the long-lasting shelling of the settlements and cities along the separation lines. The rest of the expelled population which left the cities which were in the separation line zones was not able to receive the status of the expelled persons according to the regulations which defined who are expelled persons and refugees (Decree on the Status of Expelled Persons). The majority of them at that time had already returned to their homes.

Number of refugees from Croatia who went abroad has always been difficult to establish due to the lack of precise records as well as due to the short stay of refugees from Croatia abroad (the estimate is that there were around 150.000 in December 1991). Most of them returned to the Republic of Croatia during 1992 and after that 50,000 stayed abroad (estimate from 1995). Since the agreement about return of refugees between Federal Republic of Germany and Republic of Croatia was signed in 1994, a part of those persons came back to Croatia. Their return was completed by the end of 1998 when refugees from Croatian Podunavlje were also enabled to come back.

## **11. Analysis of the data on persons expelled from the occupied areas of the Republic of Croatia from August 1991 to April 1992**

According to the official data in the central data base of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern of the Ministry of Regional Development, Forestry and Water Management, a total of 220,338 persons were registered as persons expelled from the areas occupied from 1991 to 1995, i. e. 1998 and out of the constitutional and legal system of the Republic of Croatia as a result of aggression and expulsion of non-Serb

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population in the Republic of Croatia in 1991 by the JNA /Yugoslav Peoples' Army/ and rebelled local Serbs.

The individual files on the abovementioned refugees are stored in the archives of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern and they contain documents with particulars of those persons and data on their expulsion. All those data are also stored in the electronic form in the central data base of the Department.

For the group of expelled persons who were in that status for at least four or more years, from the end of 1991 to return to their homes, at the earliest at the end of 1995, we have precise data on the date of taking refuge, so one can get a clear insight in events in 1991 in certain areas of Croatia engulfed in war.

### **Review of time and areas of expulsion of non-Serb population**

Data on the expelled population of the Republic of Croatia are divided by place of their residence – place from which the expelled persons were expelled, and by date i. e. period of expulsion. In order to be more precise, depending on the area, a certain date between August and November in 1991 was defined. Number of expelled populace has been followed from the date marked as the peak of the expulsion in a certain area to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992 when UNPROFOR took control over the occupied areas of the RH – so-called Krajina and the SBZS /Slavonia, Baranja and West Srijem/ SAO /Serbian Autonomous District/.

Based on these dates, one can establish aftermaths of certain events and expulsion of population in 1991 from the different areas engulfed in war operations.

The total of 16,909 expelled persons were registered in the period from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992 when UNPROFOR took over the control over the areas of the Republic Croatia which were occupied by then and 5<sup>th</sup> August 1995 and the *Oluja* /Storm/ Operation. A small

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number refers to prisoners exchanged from concentration camps in Serbia during 1992 as well as returnees from abroad while the largest number refers to persons expelled from the occupied areas of Croatia which were under the control of the UN forces – around 12,000 expelled persons.

Data on persons expelled after 1995 – in 1996 and 1997, refer to refugees who returned from abroad in those years and who had also been expelled in 1991 – 3.878 persons.

Data about children born in exile were given separately – 11,646 persons.

Data on the expelled population for whom we have precise data on the time of expulsion, do not include expelled persons who were accommodated abroad. The estimate is that about 50.000 expelled persons were abroad from mid 1992 to 1995 – mostly in West European countries, and a small number stayed there permanently.

### **Review of expulsion of non-Serb population from the occupied areas in 1991 by the time and period of expulsion**

Methods used by the JNA and local Serbian units in order to expel non-serb population from the areas of the Republic of Croatia occupied by them were as follows: first of all there were threats, armed incidents, individual murders and since the summer of 1991 when the open conflict broke out, shelling and destruction of many Croatian places and killing and wounding of their residents, raids of military units into Croatian villages, numerous massacres of Croatian civilians and units and capture and expulsion of civilian population. Under-armed Croatian defenders could not defend all Croatian places under attack. By the end of summer 1991 one fourth of the country was occupied by rebelled Serbs and, following the described pattern, “ethnically cleansed” of almost all non-Serb populace.

Using the method of the “burnt land”, many places close to the front line were destroyed, as well as the places taken by the rebels. Biggest part of the Croatian property was destroyed by artillery and later by arson in some places, especially in the areas taken by Serbian units. The populace was leaving in a hurry, withdrawing

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before the artillery targets and carrying only plastic bags in their hand or nothing at all. A part of the population did not manage to pull out before Serbian forces. Many are captured and killed, massacred and a part of persons left the occupied territory only later, after they had renounced their entire property to the benefit of Serbian occupying authorities.

From the occupied areas and areas under the control of Serbian units, 220.000 Croatian citizens of non-Serb ethnicity were expelled and they found refuge in other areas of the Republic of Croatia which remained under the control of the Croatian officials.

Apart from the expelled persons from the occupied areas and areas directly engulfed in war operations, another 300,000 citizens, mostly children, women and elderly left towns and settlements close to the front line which were under heavy artillery attacks from the end of summer 1991. In December 1991 in the free territory of Croatia, there were 500,000 refugees and around 150,000 of Croatian citizens found their refuge aboard.

Direct pressure and violence against populace and first relocations of Croatian who were loyal to the legitimate authorities in Zagreb, started as early as in summer 1990, after the so-called "log revolution" in the area of Knin led by local Serbian politicians (Serbian Democratic Party) and Serbian units which included local population and units from Serbia.

First expelled persons were registered in the beginning of 1991 from the area of Knin, Zadar hinterland and parts of Lika, mostly from the settlements with Serbian majority. First incidents, pressure and violence were occurring individually, especially in the territory of Knin, Lika and Banovina as early as the end of 1990, when frequent incidents resulted in flight of some non-Serb families. During 1991, incidents spread to the area of Vukovar and Borovo naselje (Borovo Selo), Pakrac and Osijek (Stara Tenja).

Escalation of maltreatment of Croatian populace in those areas happened in the spring of 1991, especially from May when, due to the break out of open clashes between

rebelled Serbs and JNA with Croatian Police, the first big wave of refugees found shelter in free parts of the country.

The first big wave of expelled persons were recorded as early as the beginning of May 1991, when non-Serb population, under the pressure and threats of the rebelled Serbs had to leave their homes in the areas of Croatia with Serbian majority – in places of Knin, Benkovac, Obrovac, Gračac and from the area of Lika. For instance, the first expelled persons from the area of Zadar were registered on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1991. The expelled persons found refuge in Croatia and abroad.

Mass expulsions started in spring 1992 and they were happening in areas and settlements with Serbian majority where the rebellion first fomented and where at that time too, numerous incidents and clashes between rebelled Serbs and JNA and Croatian Police took place as well as attacks on Croatian Police Stations and after that followed a big wave of expelled persons towards big towns in the free parts of Croatia –villages with Serbian majority in Lika and Banovina, Eastern Slavonia and Srijem around Dalj, Erdut and Borovo Selo.

The biggest number of persons was expelled in summer 1991 when organized aggression and attacks of JNA units and units of Serb rebels against numerous Croatian places started. Time of flight depended mostly on forcefulness of artillery and air force attacks on certain places and number of mass massacres committed by Serbs against civilians at certain areas. Plan of attack on certain parts of Croatia was going according to a certain schedule in order to incite flights and withdrawal of non-Serb population, thus making easier to take over the places in which only Croatian defenders were left. Mass massacres against civilians had the aim to incite a great number of people to flee.

A mass expulsion started with the expulsion of Croats from Lika in spring 1991, and continued with Banovina and Kordun, and after the break out of open clashes between Serbian forces and Croatian military and police units in July 1991 started mass expulsions of non-Serb population towards big towns in the free parts of Croatia – in the direction of Sisak, Karlovac, Zagreb, Osijek, Vinkovci, Split, Šibenik ...

After the break out of the open clash (attacks on the Croatian Police and police stations in spring 1991) and by open aggression against civilian places which started with the first JNA Air Force attack on the villages around Vukovar (13. 07. 1991), areas of Banija, Lika and Drniš in the Šibenik hinterland were first areas exposed to fierce attacks in July and August 1991. By mid-September, those entire areas were occupied. Similar plan was implemented when it comes to the flight and occupation of Posavina places around Novska and big part of Western Slavonia – places around Nova Gradiška (Okučani), a part of Pakrac and surrounding places, Lipik. After that, the attack on Eastern Slavonia and Zadar hinterland got more intense and by the end of 1991, most places in those areas fell.

Ćelije – a little village in Eastern Slavonia was attacked and totally destroyed by artillery and mortar projectiles and then burnt down on 7<sup>th</sup> July 1991. Around 200 of its residents had to flee before attacks and aggressor's units which took them over.

Later, all this was repeated according to the same or similar pattern, but included many people. It started with Banija, and then the same thing happened in Baranja and Eastern Slavonia – Dalj, Eerdut, Aljmaš.

After the Aljmaš ferry in July 1991, attacks of Serbian units on many places in all parts of Croatia were even stronger just like the expulsion of non-Serb populace. People who managed to survive fled before the attacks or direct occupation of their places in Banija, Lika, Kordun, Eastern and Western Slavonia, Dalmatia. From August and September, almost all big Croatian towns were under shells – Vukovar, Osijek, Petrinja, Sisak, Karlovac, Vinkovci, Nova Gradiška, Zadar, Šibenik, Split, Dubrovnik.

On 1<sup>st</sup> August 1994, the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare had 9,638 registered persons, but the real number of expelled persons was estimated to be around 30,000 of expelled persons. Due to everyday influx of big groups of expelled persons and lack of system which could register such a big number of people, many people were registered subsequently.

A refugee wave started spreading all over Croatia where many expelled persons were seeking refuge. After a fierce artillery attack at Dalj, a place in Eastern Slavonia

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between Osijek and Vukovar in July 1991, a massacre of remain civilians and defenders took place. Most of civilian population and scarce Croatian defenders from Dalj and surrounding villages of Erdut and Aljmaš which had survived the attack, found rescue in a flight on a ferry across the Drava River towards Osijek.

The Aljmaš ferry in July 1991 was followed by even stronger and more open artillery attacks by Serbian units on many places all over Croatia. People, who manage to survive, fled from Eastern Slavonia, Vukovar, Ilok. The towns are also under shells – Osijek, Zadar, Dubrovnik, Šibenik, Karlovac, Sisak, Vinkovci.

After initial threats of Serbian units and the former JNA, individual murders of Croatian police officers, soldiers and civilians, attacks on police stations since the Knin “log revolution” in summer 1991 in areas with significant number of Serbian populace, the open aggression against Croatia started in summer 1991. Since summer 1991 and after villages and small places around big towns, almost all Croatian big city centres were exposed to shelling. Vinkovci were first bombed from artillery and air force on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1991, Ilok on 27<sup>th</sup> July, Osijek 6<sup>th</sup> August, Otočac on 24<sup>th</sup> August, Vrlika and Kijevo on 25<sup>th</sup> August, Daruvar on 1<sup>st</sup> September, Gospić on 3<sup>rd</sup> September, Skradin on 13<sup>th</sup> September, Šibenik on 17<sup>th</sup> September, Zagreb 17<sup>th</sup> September, Zadar on 21<sup>st</sup> September, Dubrovnik on 24<sup>th</sup> September, Split on 25<sup>th</sup> September, Novska on 26<sup>th</sup> September, Sisak, Zadar. That is just a part of the list.

There are series of attacks against Croatian localities launched by the rebellious Serbs and the mobilized and professional JNA forces coming from Serbia. Civilian population, especially mothers with small children and elderly persons, are being evacuated from certain locations because of heavy artillery activities and lack of adequate shelters for the civilians. In many places there are only defenders left. Poorly armed units of the Croatian Army, the police and the volunteers can't defend many localities, especially those smaller in size.

Many civilians fled from Osijek, Vinkovci, Karlovac, Sisak, Vukovar, Zadar, Šibenik and Dubrovnik, which was under the sea blockade of the Serbian ships during the major attacks. The blockade of Dubrovnik was broken on 30<sup>th</sup> November, and then the “Libertas” convoy entered the town carrying humanitarian aid, and took away a small number of most endangered civilians. Friday 6<sup>th</sup> November 1991 was unlucky

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for both Dubrovnik and Osijek when 29 people were killed and around a hundred were wounded in artillery attacks. Dubrovnik was on fire the same day, the monuments in its historical centre of the town.

Many places in Eastern Slavonia around Vukovar, Vinkovci, Osijek, Ilok, in Banija, Western Slavonia, the hinterland of Zadar, Šibenik and Dubrovnik are temporarily taken by the Serbian troops and civilians are fleeing them. There over thousand occupied places on the list, including town such as Vukovar, Slunj, Ilok, Hrvatska Kostajnica, Drniš, Vrlika, Petrinja and briefly Lipik and part of Pakrac.

A new exodus of the non-Serb population takes place in September and October after the fall of Petrinja and Kostajnica, and reaches its peak in November of 1991 when 15,000 inhabitants of Vukovar were expelled after being isolated from the rest of Croatia and besieged in Vukovar for three months, i.e. since the August.

Many inhabitants of Vukovar, mothers with children and other civilians fled the town in late August, just before the encirclement of Vukovar. Attacks on Borovo Naselje lasted since May and in August Borovo and Vukovar were shelled on a daily basis by artillery and air force. Many Vukovar inhabitants were stricken by artillery attacks during those three months of blockade and even greater number when the JNA and Serbian irregular forces seized the town.

Around 15,000 civilians – mostly women, children and elderly persons, without men who had been singled out previously, were deported after the JNA and Serbian irregulars entered the town, and were taken on buses via Novi Sad and Bosnia to free areas of Croatia – Slavonski Brod, Đakovo, Zagreb, where they came in November of 1991. Many citizens offered assistance in emergency accommodation of Vukovar victims. All remaining hotels of Zagreb were opened in order to accommodate Vukovar victims.

At the beginning of the conflict the expelled people were fleeing on individual basis and without organization, mainly because of pressure and maltreatment and stress and in fear of bombardments, whereas further into the war they were leaving in larger groups. At first, women, children and elderly persons fled because of bombardments and shelling, and in case of certain localities there was an organized evacuation. Such

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waves of refugees occurred especially as a result of the intensification of offensive activities against certain areas, e.g. severe attack on Vukovar in late August 1991, attack on Osijek in September and late November 1991 after the fall of the Eastern Slavonia, when the population of Osijek and its surroundings, directly under attack of Serbian forces, were swept by panic. Due to fierce artillery attacks, the trains did not depart from the Osijek central station, but from the suburbs; they rode along the side railroads and were constantly overcrowded.

Men joined them later, as one place fell after another. Part of the population, mainly the small groups, was retreating together with the defenders who had to leave particular localities because of severe attacks. Some of them managed to escape tanks and Serbian troops that were taking over the locality and setting houses on fire, killing and massacring the remaining population that failed to, mainly the elderly. It is during such flights that many people got killed, as was the case in Slunj and the surrounding villages. In November the citizens of Ilok were subject to a typical expulsion, as well as those of Vukovar; what followed was a terrible massacre and genocide over the remaining 15,000 inhabitants and defenders.

The available data show that most of the refugees found shelter in safer areas of Croatia as early as late October 1991. A minority (around 20%) became the expelled persons by the end of October, mainly because their places of residence were taken, they had to run away from the Serbian occupational troops or they were expelled from the occupied localities. Many men, members of Croatian defence forces, were among them, and their families had been evacuated earlier.

Official data show that 10,700 preschool children and 22,000 elementary and secondary school children and 1,450 teachers fled the areas engulfed by war by 15<sup>th</sup> November 1991. Civilians fled many localities to avoid arrival of Serbian tanks and soldiers, and to avoid massacre.

### **Banovina – Sisak-Moslavina County**

Among first refugees there were 300 inhabitants of Kraljevčani and Dragotinci in Banija, who left their villages that were under severe artillery attack (14<sup>th</sup> July 1991).

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It was the beginning of a large refugee column of people who fled carrying only plastic bags or nothing, only some of them managed to take a car or a tractor with some clothes. Refugee waves from Kozibrod, Dvor, Strug followed...More than 6,000 civilians escaped from eleven Banija villages in late July. Individual massacres started occurring in the beginning of the aggression on Banovina, and in late July a massacre over Croatian civilians and soldiers took place in Struga, what speeded up the persecution of civilians and the "ethnic cleansing" of Banija.

After three weeks of severe artillery attacks and no electricity, water or food, the civilians were forced to leave Hrvatska Kostajnica, the largest Croatian settlement in Banovina besides Petrinja, and also the surrounding settlements. Column of cars, trucks and tractors carried the people to safer areas of Croatia, the areas of Sisak and Zagreb, towns that soon became bombardment targets themselves. The Croatian defence forces defended the town until 13<sup>th</sup> September when that settlement fell and the surviving defenders were taken by the JNA and Serbian irregular troops to Manjača camp near Banja Luka, in a neighboring country that was not in war yet. German journalist Egon SCOTLAND (*Suddeutsche Zeitung*) and Croatian Television cameraman Gordan LEDERER were killed in the area of Hrvatska Kostajnica.

Massacres of civilians in Banija continued in the villages around Petrinja, and one of the biggest massacres was carried out by Serbian terrorists over inhabitants of Skela settlement. Petrinja fell at the end of September, the biggest town in Banovina, and large majority of civilians escape towards Sisak and Zagreb. Rest of civilians and defenders who stay in the /enemy/ encirclement are exposed to massacre. Large majority of them are listed as missing after that.

According to the official figures of Department for Areas of Special State Concern, there were 22,001 expelled persons from Sisak - Moslavina County up to 20<sup>th</sup> of September 1991, and 8,478 more from that date up to the 1<sup>st</sup> of May 1992.

### **Croatian Danube Region – Osijek - Baranja County and Vukovar - Srijem County**

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Massive taking refuge of non-Serb population from the Croatian Danube Region begins in the end of July 1991 with artillery attacks on Dalj, Erdut and Aljmaš, places near Osijek. 10,000 of civilians from that three big Slavonian villages are in encirclement from all sides and escape by ferry-boat across the Danube towards Osijek. Small number of poorly armed inhabitants and policemen stay behind to defend that places, and most of them are killed in action. Massacres in Dalj, Erdut and Aljmaš, as well as flight of inhabitants towards Osijek by ferry boat across the Drava River and demolition of church tower in Aljmaš, happened simultaneously with the session of Croatian Parliament in Zagreb. The whole Croatian public was alarmed by these pictures.

Along with the attacks of the rebel Serbs, organized in the Serbian paramilitary units – Chetniks and JNA /Yugoslav People's Army/, surprise attacks, forcible abductions of civilians, sniper rifle and mortar attacks on numerous places around Serbian strongholds in eastern Slavonia have been going on since the spring of 1991. It started on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of May when 15 Croatian policemen were killed and slaughtered in Borovo Selo near Vukovar.

One of the largest waves of refugees came from Baranja in the summer of 1991, in which Serbian tanks and army come in the beginning of July. At the end of August, Serbian Army and the units of rebel Serbs terrorized Croatian, Hungarian and other non-Serb inhabitants of Baranja and launched artillery attacks to some towns. Beli Manastir, the largest town in Baranja, was shelled on the 7<sup>th</sup> of August by Serbian units. The first wave of refugees, about 5,000 people, escaped towards Osijek from the terror and artillery attacks on some towns of Baranja on 22<sup>nd</sup> August. Up to the fall of Bilje, the last Baranja town, on 3<sup>rd</sup> September, tens of thousands of people left their homes in Baranja and escaped to the free /unoccupied/ territory of Croatia.

However, it is just the beginning of expulsion and exodus of non-Serb population from the occupied and war-affected areas of Croatia, which culminated in November of 1991 by forcing 30,000 citizens of Vukovar to leave their homes, after three – month siege of this town. After Vukovar tragedy, Serbs took hold of the places around Osijek which were still defending themselves – Ernestinovo on the 20<sup>th</sup> of November 1991, Laslovo on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1991, Antunovac and Tenja on the 5<sup>th</sup> of December 1991, and then Nijemci, Apševci, Đeletovci, Lipovac and Podgrađe as well. Osijek

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recorded one of the largest exoduses right after the fall of Vukovar; columns of people from the nearby places under heavy attacks escape towards Osijek. Civilians have been evacuated and given shelter from towns against which the Serbian Army launched the most violent offensive up to that point. After finding the first shelter in Osijek and Vinkovci, many of them went to the safer parts of the country, which were few in that period of time. Osijek and Vinkovci were exposed to hell-daily bombardment. Many inhabitants left Osijek and Vinkovci, mostly mothers with small children, older and helpless ones, finding the shelter in the safe parts of the country and abroad. Hungary officially issued a statement that over 35,000 Croatian citizens found the refugee shelter there.

After the fall of Čelije and Tenja, then Aljmaš, Dalj and Erdut and Baranja, the escape of the rest of non-Serb population has been accelerated in the end of summer of 1991. Units of the former JNA advanced with their heavy arms from Serbia across the Danube River through the western Srijem towards Vukovar and Vinkovci, and through Baranja towards Osijek, using their strongholds in the villages with Serbian majority in the area of eastern Slavonia. Tovarnik falls in the beginning of October and its inhabitants escaped before tanks and they broke out the encirclement towards Vinkovci and Ilok. Those who did not manage to do so were exposed to massacre and terror; majority of those who survived were forced to leave their homes in the winter and spring of 1992. Jankovci, Ilača, Lovas, Sotin, Šarengard, Opatovo, Babska, Johovaci, Marinci and Bogdanovci fell as well after Tovarnik.

Ilok, the easternmost town of Croatia, was completely encircled by the Serbian Army. Columns of expelled persons from the nearby places in Srijem were pouring to Ilok during the summer /of 1991/. The former JNA gave an ultimatum that all Croats must leave the town by 16:00 hrs on 17<sup>th</sup> of October. Convoy of cars, tractors and other vehicles with about 10,000 civilians were forced to leave their town. Free territories of Croatia were faced with another huge strike of crisis of expelled persons in one day.

The largest humanitarian and expelled persons' disaster happened with the fall of Vukovar. After three-month siege of the town from all sides, the JNA and Serbian paramilitaries entered the town from 17<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> of November 1991.

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Many inhabitants of Vukovar, mothers with children and other civilians escaped from the town before the complete encirclement. The last such convoy, on which the wounded from Vukovar hospital were pulled out, passed on the 28<sup>th</sup> of September 1991. The escape of the civilians from Vukovar started in the beginning of summer, when a number of school children were evacuated as well. Attacks on Borovo Naselje, a part of Vukovar, lasted from May with some interruptions; Borovo Naselje and Vukovar were shelled and bombed daily by artillery and aircraft. A large number of inhabitants of Vukovar were killed or wounded in the artillery attacks during these three months of blockade, and even more of them in November, during the JNA and Serbian paramilitaries' seizure of the town.

When the JNA and Serbian paramilitaries entered the town, a large number of civilians and defenders were killed or taken to the unknown direction – almost all males from the age of 15 to 65. Civilians were brought together at several collection centres in Vukovar (“Velepromet” warehouse, “Borovo Komerc”, Ovčara, Dalj). About 15,000 civilians – women with children and elderly people but without men who are separated, exhausted by a three-month blockade, inadequate supply and staying in basements and shelters – were deported by buses via Novi Sad and Bosnia to free territories of Croatia – Slavonski Brod, Đakovo, Zagreb. The first convoy with the expelled inhabitants of Vukovar, civilians and small number of wounded, came to Zagreb on 21<sup>st</sup> November. About 3,000 of them were offered emergency care at Zagreb Trade Fair around 21:00 hrs. Small number of people from that convoy stayed in Slavonski Brod and Đakovo. Large number of citizens became involved in offering emergency care to the Vukovar victims; large number of volunteers, members of numerous organizations and institutions of Croatian state were trying to obtain enough sandwiches, juices, blankets, beds as an urgent help to expelled Vukovar. The last group of Vukovar civilians arrived on 24<sup>th</sup> November. All hotels in Zagreb, including the most elite one, “Intercontinental”, were opened in order to accommodate all expelled persons from Vukovar, exhausted by three-month staying in shelters of the attacked and besieged town, as well as aggressor's harassment after their captivation; “Intercontinental” became some sort of the headquarters for offering emergency care to people from Vukovar.

A large number of civilians and defenders were captured and taken to the unknown direction by the Serbs during seizure of town. The International Committee of the Red

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Cross found some of them imprisoned in the camps in Serbia and Bosnia and Herzegovina. A part of these people was released - exchanged later, and part of the people from Vukovar is considered missing after that, because after their capture they disappeared without a trace. The largest exchange was on the 14<sup>th</sup> of August 1992 in Nemetin, when 400 prisoners, mostly from Vukovar, were released.

According to the official figures of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern, there were 44,577 expelled persons from County of Osijek and Baranja and County of Vukovar and Srijem (Vukovar is not included) up to 20<sup>th</sup> October 1991, and 10,875 more from that date up to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992. In total, 64, 483 persons, mostly non-Serbs, were expelled from the areas affected by war and then occupied within these two Counties; town of Vukovar and children born in taking refuge are not counted in.

According to the official figures of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern, 14,798 persons were expelled from Vukovar up to 18<sup>th</sup> November 1991, and 7,019 more after that date; these 7,019 persons were mostly prisoners of concentration camps in Serbia and defenders who registered themselves as expelled persons later on. In total, there were 24,322 expelled persons from the town of Vukovar, mostly non-Serbs, and children born in taking refuge are not counted in.

### **Dalmatia - Zadar County, Šibenik - Knin County and Split - Dalmatia County**

Dalmatian towns of Zadar, Šibenik and Split were the shelter for numerous expelled persons from the immediate surrounding of these towns in the summer of 1991, and they were exposed to heavy attacks of Serbian artillery and aviation at the same time, especially Zadar and Šibenik. First refugees from Knin and Benkovac were registered in mid - May 1991; those are the towns with Serbian majority and Croatian population is expelled from there as a result of individual incidents and frequent threats.

Expelled persons come in large groups in September. Serbs devastated and seized places in the Zadar hinterland one after the other – Kruševo, Jasenice, Islam Latinski, Zeleni Hrast, Škabrnja, Murvica, Crno, Nadin, Novigrad, Pridraga, Paljuv and Pogradina – from 11<sup>th</sup> September to the New Year's Eve of 1991. At first only a part

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of the civilians came, and then the rest escaped before the tanks and the occupational units. In mid-September a large group of expelled persons from Drniš, who escaped from the artillery attacks and invasion of the Serbian units, found the shelter in Šibenik and Split.

The massacre of civilians in Škabrnja, which the Serbian units and tanks entered on 18<sup>th</sup> November, caused fear in the whole area. In this way the fear spreads among civilians in the places which the Serbs have not seized yet, and the rest of population escaped hurriedly. The Maslenica Bridge, which connects Dalmatia with the rest of Croatia, was destroyed on 21<sup>st</sup> November, and the communication blockade of the southern part of Croatia was going on from that moment up to the beginning of 1993 and Maslenica action.

According to the official figures of the Department for Areas of Special State Concern, there were 31,675 expelled persons from the area of three Dalmatian Counties without Dubrovnik up to 20<sup>th</sup> September 1991, and 12,310 more after that date up to 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992. In total, there were 50,893 expelled persons, mostly non – Serbs, from the areas affected by war and then occupied within these three Dalmatian Counties (children born in taking refuge are not counted in).

### **Kordun and Lika – Karlovac County and Lika - Senj County**

Slunj and the nearby places fell as the last Croatian strongholds in Kordun in November 1991. About 2,200 people found the salvation by escaping through the forest towards Bosnia and Herzegovina. The rest of civilians were trying to escape towards Karlovac, and part of them were killed or wounded in the attacks of the Serbian units and were massacred. Slunj and many nearby places were in flames.

An open aggression and first direct conflicts of the Croatian police with the Serbian paramilitaries and the JNA got started exactly in Lika, from the Easter 1991 when the first Croatian policeman was killed in the Croatian War of Independence, at Plitvice, in the end of March. Members of non-Serb population, mostly Croats, were exposed to threats and murders in the places with Serbian majority. Many people left their homes already in spring, looking for shelter in Gospić, Karlobag and other places still

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unaffected by war. From the beginning of September, Gospić and all places under the control of the Croatian Army, police and volunteers were exposed to constant and heavy artillery and air strikes of JA /Yugoslav Army/. Part of the centre of Gospić was destroyed by fire in one of these attacks. By the end of the year, a large number of civilians were looking for shelter in the safer parts of Croatia during these heaviest attacks.

According to the official figures of the Departure for Areas of Special State Concern, from the total number of 23 451 registered expelled persons, there were 19,798 expelled persons from the area of Karlovac and Lika up to mid - November 1991 (children born in refuge are not counted in).

#### **Situation in the occupied territories after 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992 up to 5<sup>th</sup> August 1995**

In the period from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1992, when UNPROFOR took the control over the occupied territories of Republic of Croatia, up to 5<sup>th</sup> August 1995 and “Oluja” action, there were 16,909 registered expelled persons. Small number are the prisoners exchanged from the concentration camps in Serbia during 1992 and returnees from abroad, and the largest number – about 12,000 expelled persons - is the population expelled from the Croatian occupied territories which were under UN forces surveillance in that period.

The UNPROFOR mandate started in May 1992. Although it stopped armed conflicts, the arrival of UNPROFOR did not offer safety to the Croats in the occupied territories. From the establishment of UNPROFOR Administration in the spring of 1992 up to the end of 1994, about 12,000 of Croats and other non-Serb minorities were expelled, and 600 were killed (mostly older persons who stayed in their homes) in the areas under control of Serbian Krajina authorities.

In the beginning of 1995, the Croatian population still remaining in the occupied territories was estimated to several thousands (about 6,000 of Croats, according to the figures of Department for Information within the Ministry of Health).

For example, in the beginning of May 1995 Serbs expelled about a hundred persons from the places around Ilok towards Serbia. After more than a month of staying in Serbia, 79 expelled persons, mostly older men, were taken over on 29<sup>th</sup> of June 1995 on the free Croatian territory. Part of the Serbs from up-to recently occupied parts of Slavonia and Baranja, which escaped during “Bljesak” /Flash/ action to the north-eastern Bosnia under the occupation of Bosnian Serbs, are settled to the occupied parts of eastern Slavonia. However, part of the Serbs which escaped during the action asked to be able to return to their homes in free territories of Croatia, and UNHCR /UN High Commission for Refugees/ was asked to organize their return.

## **12. National structure of the expelled population**

Special analysis concerns the national structure of expelled persons – most of them, 205,215, are Croats, and the rest of 15,000 of the expelled persons concerns the other ethnic groups whose members were expelled together with the Croatian population: 4,987 are Hungarians and 3,104 are Serbs.

Almost the entire Croatian population and other non-Serb population are expelled from the territories of the Republic of Croatia which were occupied in 1991. The largest number was accommodated in Croatia, and some expelled persons like Hungarians were in large part accommodated in Hungary. It clearly shows that the main criterion of expulsion was national affiliation, in other words non - affiliation to the Serbian population.

Table number 10 with the age and gender structure of the expelled persons is also enclosed.

### **13. Figures on the refuge population of Croatian nationality from Vojvodina and Serbia**

We have no figures on the total number of persons expelled from the territory of Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, as all refuge - persons did not register themselves as refugees in Croatia; significant number came to Croatia after they exchanged their property. It is mostly relative to the Croats from Vojvodina.

Total number of 12,601 persons with the residence in the territory of Serbia in 1991 is registered in the central base of information of the Administration of Special State Concern. At least 7,374 of them are Croats. Most of 3 244 persons for which we have no information about nationality are also Croats who escaped from Serbia up to 1995; these persons have been registered as beneficiaries of accommodation care since 2002 and were not registered as refugees before, so we have no information of their nationality (although most of them are Croats) and the date of their taking refuge.

Number of 5,131 refugees, mostly Croats, is registered from the territory of Vojvodina. Major part of them is registered up to 1995 – 1,868 persons, since it is a matter of persons who did not manage to exchange their property up to their arrival and they asked to be protected as refugees because of that. The largest number of Croats who escaped up to 1995 exchanged their property and did not ask the status of a refugee upon their arrival to Croatia.

Methods of expulsion were similar to those already described in Croatia – from individual threats and incidents in places with Croatian population to the murders of Croats in the period from 1991 to 1995, and the consequence of it was exodus of the majority of Croatian population.

Majority of these persons were registered as refugees in the Republic of Croatia at the Office for Expelled Persons and Refugees of the Republic of Croatia. Persons of Croatian nationality who have not exchanged or sold their property prior to their refuge usually registered themselves as refugees. Emergency care was offered and organized for these people on several occasions, including Croats from Kosovo as well, from Janjevo and Letnica, who are accommodated in an organized manner to

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several places in Croatia, as well as taking care of smaller number of Croats from Vojvodina in 1995 during the military police operation "Oluja", when Croats were expelled from several places in Vojvodina (from Kukujevci, Gibarac and Golubinci).

However, figures of the associations of the Croats expelled from SRJ vary from 20,000 to 30,000 refugees from the territory of Vojvodina. Association of the Croats who took refuge - Association of the Croats Expelled from Srijem, Bačka and Banat, founded in 1991 in Croatia, was making the list of Croats expelled from Vojvodina and staying in Croatia on several occasions. About 8,000 persons, expelled from Serbia in the period from 1993 to 1998, were registered by that association.

According to the figures of the above mentioned association, 7,000 people were expelled from the places in Vojvodina as follows: 1,920 persons from Hrtkovci (Ruma), 1,600 persons from Beška (Indija), 1,900 persons from Slankamen (Indija), 1,500 persons from Golubinci (Stara Pazova), 2,000 persons from Kukujevci (Šid), 1,000 persons from Sremska Mitrovica (Sr. Mitrovica), 1,000 persons from Petrovaradin (Novi Sad), 800 persons from Gibarac (Šid), 600 persons from Šid (Šid), 300 persons from Sremski Karlovci (Novi Sad), 500 persons from Morović (Šid), 250 persons from Sot (Šid), 400 persons from Vašica (Šid), 200 persons from Ruma (Ruma), 200 persons from Nikinci (Ruma), 200 persons from Novi Banovci (Stara Pazova), 200 persons from Platičevo (Ruma), 250 persons from Indija (Ruma). The Association has no individually systematized figures, since processing of the poll has not been finished yet.

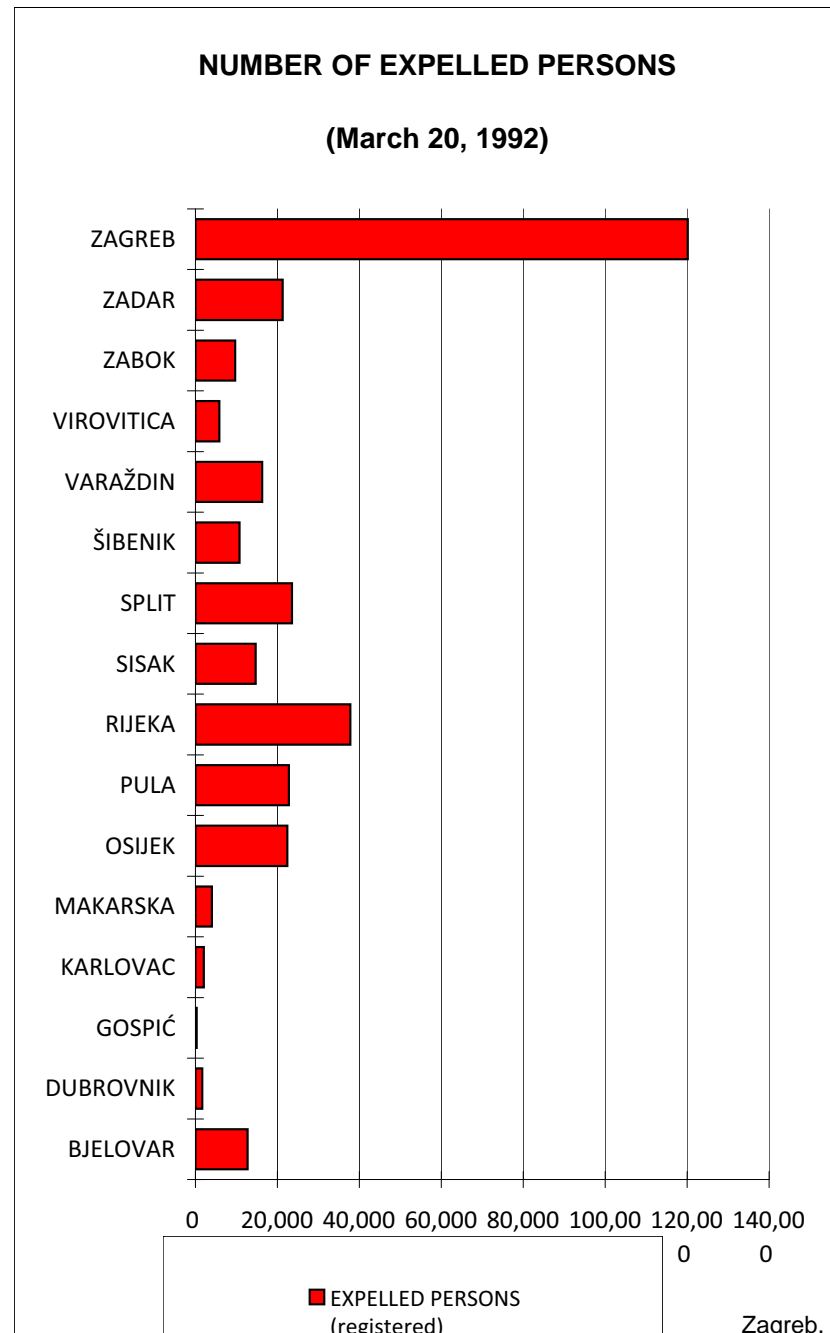
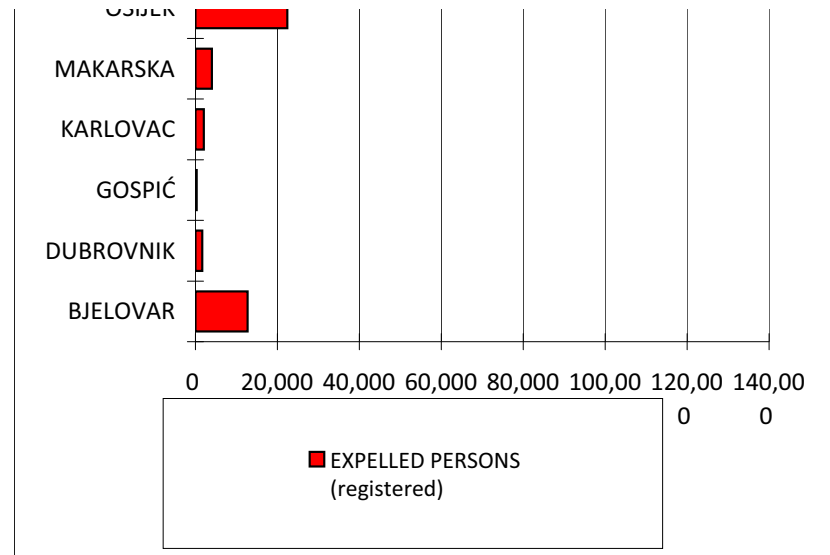
