Commencing 01 October 2007”

1. General Dragoljub Ojdanic’s Defence hereby gives notice of witnesses which it intends to call for the trial week commencing 1st October 2007.

2. General Ojdanic’s Defence wants to underline that the summary of each witness’s testimony, as it appears below, was submitted to the Trial Chamber and the OTP on 15 June, 2007 on the assumption that each witness would testify "live". To minimize any claim by any party that it may have been "surprised" by some aspect of the witness's testimony, the defence opted to submit a very detailed, comprehensive summary of the testimony.

After the time constraints imposed at the pre-defence conference of 22 June, 2007, the defence decided to submit a 92 ter statement for the great majority of witnesses in the interests of saving trial time. The 92 ter statement contains essentially the same information that is in the below summary. We realize, with apologies to the Trial Chamber and parties to this trial, that the below "summaries" are overly long and detailed primarily for the reasons stated above. We believe that to submit a more streamlined summary at this point would run the risk of perhaps misleading the other parties on what will be presented at the trial on direct examination. In any event, we represent to the Trial Chamber that the direct testimony, aside from parts which are not embraced by the 92ter statement, will cover only those parts of the witness statement that need further emphasis and clarification, including testimony related to the exhibits to be introduced and referred to by the witness.

3. In the trial week commencing 1st October 2007 General Dragoljub Ojdanic’s defence calls the following witnesses:

65ter Summary

1. General Gojovic, a lawyer, spent some forty years in the Yugoslav army before retiring in 2001. He was President of the Military Court in Belgrade from January, 1994 to April 16, 1999 when he was appointed Chief of the Legal Department of the General Staff of the army of Yugoslavia. Prior to his appointment, he met with General Ojdanic, then the Army's Chief of Staff. General Ojdanic instructed him to do whatever was possible to make the criminal justice system operate more effectively.
2. General Gojovic will testify concerning his efforts to improve the criminal justice system including bringing into the army a number of new judges and prosecutors and setting up additional detention units. He will describe the processing of a criminal case from the detection of the crime to the ultimate punishment of the perpetrator. He will testify that the army required every soldier to receive instructions on the code of conduct during war and the necessity to behave in accordance with international humanitarian law.
3. He will testify concerning his knowledge of reports compiled by the army which set forth crimes committed by army personnel in Kosovo during the war and the disposition of those cases. He will also testify to investigations conducted under army auspices at various grave sites in Kosovo with respect to crimes committed by unknown perpetrators.
4. General Gojovic will testify concerning his knowledge of various Supreme Command Staff orders which stressed the importance of reporting war crimes and the duties of all soldiers to obey international humanitarian law. He will further testify that, in his opinion, the Army's general staff, including general Ojdanic, continually made good faith efforts to prevent war crimes and to detect and punish offenders. He will testify that he personally does not know of a single war crime that was not reported or was somehow concealed by any member of the army. In his experience, if a crime was reported, it was investigated and processed through the system.

65ter Summary

1. The witness has discharged various command and staff duties at the Yugoslav National Army, The Army of Yugoslavia and the Army of the state union of Serbia and Montenegro. He was retired in the rank of a colonel-general on 18th Feb 2005. In the second half of 1998 he was Advisor, MOD, for Defence Policy and International Military Cooperation.

It was at the mid of January 1999 that he resumed the position of the Chief of the Intelligence Department, GS VJ.

2. When he returned to the General Staff, in mid January 1999, one of his first duties were to look into defence plans. He declared under full responsibility that there was neither any special plan in existence, nor, possibly, an annex to a global plan, nor any specific document or a directive section where there was any mention of a mass or any other kind of eviction of Kosovo Albanians from Kosovo and Metohija.

3. In his subsequent work with the GS, he has never attended any meeting dealing with any such topic.

4. Witness wants to point out two more things:

(1) during his entire military education he studied all strategic, operative and tactical documents, rules and regulations, and he never encountered a single provision or topic implying any kind of eviction of citizens; on the contrary, everything he has learned was aimed at procedures and actions aimed at the defence of citizens, as it can be easily verified by inspection of those documents; and

(2) in 1999, during the war when the problem of refugees has become evident, the General Staff has, on its initiative, issued a proclamation asking Kosovo Albanians not to leave their homes.

5. The witness will say that he is not aware that the VJ GS - the Staff of Supreme Command has ordered anyone, either in writing or orally, or approved any operations

aimed against civilian population. He will also maintain that both the then members of the GS and its current personnel have been without any knowledge of either any theoretical or practical operations aimed against civilian populations.

6. Combat operations were exclusively aimed against the Kosovo Liberation Army (KLA) and were of the antiterrorist character. Once the bombing campaign was launched, the purpose of combat operations of our forces was also to defend the country against attacks of NATO forces.

7. The witness will also testify that according to his best knowledge the assertion of the Prosecution on existence of a criminal plan aimed at eviction of Kosovo Albanians is untrue. There was no way to hide possible existence of any such plan, and he is positive that there is no such plan in existence; furthermore, the stated operation has not been planned nor has made a part of any other plans and orders of the General Staff.

8. The witness will testify that the Staff Meeting of the GS Chief was regularly held once a week. Occasionally, extraordinary Staff Meetings were organized as well. He used to brief and report at those meetings almost regularly, and the contents of his briefing exclusively referred to the intelligence data, meaning, they referred to activities of foreign armed forces in the territory and the reflection of those activities on the security and defence of FRY. As he had frequent contacts with foreign representatives, and if happened that he had any observations of importance from those meetings, he would shortly mention them in his briefs as well.

9. He will also confirm that he acted upon his own judgment and whenever he felt it necessary to do so, he would present his own proposal on what should be done with respect to the external factor.

10. The witness will specify the type of planning documents that were produced by the General Staff from the time he had resumed the position of the Intelligence Chief and until the break up of the war.

11. He will also testify that the reinforcement of FRY forces around and in the territory of Kosovo and Metohija were closely connected with the activities of NATO forces in the surrounding countries.

12. He will also testify about contacts that general Ojdanic has had with General Clark by the beginning of war.

13. The witness will testify about the facts that were known to Yugoslav Army about the volume of preparations NATO has completed, relative to the experience from October 1998.

14. He will also testify about his contacts and initiatives with the NATO member countries (USA and Germany), which were undertaken by Yugoslav Army for peaceful resolution of the crisis in the period February - March 1999.

15. During the war it was the Intelligence Department, which has on several occasions initiated and accepted the initiatives on the termination of war.

16. The witness will testify that he was a member of VJ negotiating team in Kumanovo. As for the attitude of the other party, he was under the impression that the team was met with a professional and correct welcome at the NATO base, and that they were treated as partners in a process of completing an important task that would put the end to the war.

17. Furthermore, NATO representatives have presented a draft agreement and they were open for any suggestions and proposals, which opportunity was used by VJ team, and because of which those negotiations have lasted for three days.

18. He will further testify that the absence of any general political agreement prior to the negotiations of military and technical issues, has posed a necessity to deal with issues of political nature as well. He will say that he remembers the way General Jackson, NATO forces commander, has kept persuading them so that they should, in the capacity of representatives of a sovereign country, accept and allow KFOR forces to enter the territory of K&M even without the UN SC resolutions, which was rejected by the team.

19. The witness again wants to point out to a specific controversy he had observed during negotiations: on one side, VJ team was eager to successfully complete the negotiations in the shortest possible term, as they were aware that it would mean the end of the war, and for them militaries it was the primary interest; on the other hand, they have done their best to improve the wording of the Agreement, being aware of its special importance which, as a result, has prolonged the time of negotiations and of bombing campaign as well.

20. The witness will testify that he does not know of any fact which could verify allegations of the Prosecutor, in the sense that Ojdanic had provided assistance and supported the committing of crime in K&M. The witness has neither seen a single document signed by General Ojdanic nor has he heard any statement made by General Ojdanic, which could bring him any near to the statement that he had any connection with the support of crime. His preoccupation, instead, was focused only on the way the country should be defended, by officially permitted means.

21. The witness will testify that the Prosecution's allegation that General Ojdanic, to say the least, was aware that his orders would lead to committing crimes, was without any solid grounds. The situation was quite the contrary, as General Ojdanic has repeatedly stressed the importance of strict observances of international humanitarian law provisions.

22. The witness will testify that the aggression, that is, the offensive operations from the territory of Albania were launched on 9 April at the section of the Yugoslav-Albanian border, along the Junik-Decani main avenue.

23. The purpose of those operations was to engage KLA, supported by the Army of Albania and NATO air forces, to establish a bridge-head in the area of Morina and Kosare watch-towers and to create conditions to bring in forces for further advancement into the territory of Metohija, with the view of cutting the Pec-Djakovica-Prizren road communications and joining the KLA forces in K&M.

24. The witness further maintains that according to data and estimations which were available to the GS VJ, for the realization of this task between 3,000 and 4,000 KLA members were engaged in the first echelon. The reserve was composed by another 7,000 to 10,000 KLA fighters.

25. He will also testify that in order to support those forces NATO had also engaged B-52 strategic bombers. He will also testify that even this attack has not produced any significant result and was aborted on 5 June.

26. The witness will testify that even after 45 days of constant daily bombing the aggressor has failed to achieve its planned goals, and the centre of ground operations was moved in the direction of Vrbnica, across Mt. Pastrok.

27. The witness will testify about what he knew about the cooperation of the NATO countries' representatives with KLA.

28. He will provide testimony on how long he knows General Ojdanic and on his personal characteristics. He has known General Ojdanic since 1965, when he took the position of the junior commander with the 20th class of the Military Academy, Army, in which the witness was a student – cadet (different names were used for this category of military personnel). He was an excellent young officer, very professional, strict and righteous. The witness remember having a colleague, a Kosovo Albanian named Mucaj Bajram, who had many difficulties to get accustomed to new surroundings at the beginning. It was Ojdanic who repeatedly insisted that they should help him to complete the Military Academy, and he did complete it.

29. The second period of a more intensive contact with Ojdanic was in 1985/86, when they were together in the National Defence School (which in that time was called Command Staff School of Operations). In those days lieutenant colonel i.e. colonel Ojdanic was the brigade commander in Prizren. He often commented on good working conditions there, saying that he had made friends among both Serbians and Kosovo Albanians. As soon as he completed the school, the witness was assigned to the duty of a brigade commander. As soon as colonel Ojdanic has heard the news, he called him and suggested he should come to Prizren, where he would be fine, and where the environment was good, etc.

30. The third period of their intensive cooperation took place in 1998/99. The witness will testify that the seminar on implementation of international humanitarian laws was organized in Belgrade at the end of 1998. General Ojdanic was in charge of the seminar, while the witness was only a participant. The witness will also testify that General Ojdanic insisted that the subject matter should be brought to the knowledge of as many people as possible. He contacted many foreign representatives who attended the seminar, and expressed his optimism concerning the resolution of the K&M crisis.

31. The witness will also testify that at the beginning of 1999, when General Ojdanic was the Chief of the General Staff and the witness was the Chief of Intelligence Department, the two of them had worked a lot together to find a peaceful way to overcome the crisis, hoping that after the Agreement from October 1998 all problems would be resolved by political means.

32. He will also say that during the war it was General Ojdanic who has repeatedly underlined that all activities should be conducted exclusively in line with the law, in line with both international and our regulations.

33. He will speak about his own belief, and after he has known General Ojdanic for so many years, and after he has seen him in different situations, that it is not inherent in General Ojdanic to do anything, which might resemble any form of crime or breach of the international humanitarian law provisions. The witness will declare that under his full responsibility. In particular, General Ojdanic surely is not a hard core nationalist; he possesses many qualities of a true commander, which he demonstrated under various circumstances, and even under the most difficult ones.

65ter Summary

1. He completed elementary and high school in Pozarevac. He graduated from the Military Academy, Infantry Department, in 1967. He completed Command-Staff Academy in 1979 and Command-Staff School of Operations in 1987. He was promoted by selection to the ranks of a lieutenant colonel and lieutenant general. He was decorated on several occasions. He served in Bileca, Belgrade, Vranje, Stip, Belgrade, Valjevo, Smederevska Palanka, Kragujevac and Belgrade. His professional references were mostly „excellent” or „distinguished”.

2. He discharged duties of: cadet platoon junior commander, company commander, battalion deputy commander, battalion commander, firing and tactics instructor, brigade operations officer, commander of the guard regiment, brigade commander, brigades group commander, operations officer of the Kragujevac Corps, Chief of Training Section for the 1st Military District and Army, Training Section in the 1st Military District and Army, 1st Army Chief of Operations and Training and Chief of the First Department, Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs, GS VJ. His recent most important functions comprised:

- Chief of Operative-Training Activities of the 1st Army and at the same time Deputy of the Army's Chief of Staff, from October 1993 until the end of 1998, and
- Chief of the First Department, Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs, and at the same time Deputy Chief of the Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs from 13th January 1999 until 30th September 2001.

3. He was promoted to the rank of major-general on 16th June 1995 and to the rank of lieutenant-general on 31st December 1998. By the decree of the President of FRY of 28th December 1998, he was transferred to the General Staff, VJ and in the period 8-13 January 1999 he took the post of the Chief of the First Department, Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs, GS VJ.

4. The witness will testify that the First (Operations) Department, being a part of the Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs, represents a staff- and coordinating intra-service body. Principle functions of the Department comprise:

- Planning the deployment of VJ
- VJ's combat preparedness
- Strategic camouflage system
- Planning the development of VJ
- Duty to secure state borders
- System of command
- Duty service
- Alert system and readiness
- Setting out strategic grounds for mobilization
- Planning and organizing the territory
- Geo-topographic support
- Scientific research in war arts

5. The witness will provide explanation on internal organizational units of the Department, as follows:

- Deployment Planning Section
- Combat Preparedness Section
- Operations and Staff Affairs Section
- Section for Border Service
- Geodesic Section
- Operations Centre of the GS VJ
- Office and incoming/outgoing mail records keeping

The Institute of Military Geographic is also subordinated to this Department.

6. The witness will explain how he took the post of the Department Chief at the beginning of 1999. He will talk about his experience, about regular studying of the daily operations report. In particular, he has monitored the situation along the state borders, incidents and breaches of the border regime.

7. He will testify that starting as of 13th January 1999 in the capacity of the Chief of Department he attended and participated in the Meetings of the Chief of General Staff, VJ and of the Supreme Command Staff at war. He will explain within the scope of his duties before the outbreak of aggression he had worked together with the Department and other bodies of the VJ General Staff on updating of plans for special purposes, on creation of orders, and other key documents, based on which he had become well acquainted with the method of work at the GS VJ and especially that of General Ojdanic.

8. He will testify to say that in the process of taking the post of the Chief of First Department, Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs, he was informed in detail about all the plans that were made at the GS VJ. The same applies to the defence plans against aggression. He will continue to add that as of the coming of General Ojdanic at the head of GS VJ, the plans and orders that had been made by previous CGA were not changed. When appointed CGS General Ojdanic did not change any order - plan. He will testify to say that in the same period some orders were formulated with a view of gradually improving combat preparedness of the 3rd Army and of the Pristina Corps, with the aim of preventing surprise.

9. The witness will explain in detail the way and manner in which combat reports produced by commands of strategic groups were examined. He paid special attention to combat reports of the 3rd Army.

10. He will testify about the experience he has had as a direct participant in the preparations of a broader Staff Meeting, which took place at the beginning of February 1999, and was organized with the view of briefing the President. The Meeting dealt with the plan of preventing a forceful bringing of multinational NATO troops from the territories of Macedonia and Albania into the territory of K&M, and the plan was entrusted to the First Department.

11. The witness testifies that as a member of the Supreme Command Staff he personally participated, together with his associated, in the making of combat documents, reports, analyses, orders, instructions, plans, warnings, telegrams, and similar. He will continue to say that General Ojdanic always insisted on strict observance of the tasks entrusted to VJ, which ensued from the rules and instructions on the combat deployment of units.

12. The witness will speak about his knowledge of and about his experience regarding preparation of Chief, Supreme Command Staff, documents for signing, and once they were signed, the procedure which was followed for their recording, filing and dispatch. When various documents, telegrams, reports arrived to Supreme Command Staff they were first recorded in the Operative Record Book (as this Department was keeping records and maintaining files for the entire Command Post), and then passed to the CGS (Supreme Command Staff) Office. He will also explain the procedure used to process telegrams addressed personally to the CGS.

13. The witness will provide evidence on the method of work of General Ojdanic if it happened that something was not clear. According to the witness, General Ojdanic would ask for the clarification, in order to have all misunderstanding avoided.

14. The witness will tell about his experience from the way he organized the keeping of entire combat and operative documentation during the aggression, which was either prescribed by Guidelines or the keeping of which was ordered. He was in charge of daily updating of all those documents, and he will continue to say that he paid special attention to the timely production of a combat report, on regular, updated and precise keeping of the operative and war journal of the Supreme Command Staff.

15. The will say that he received orders from General Ojdanic, in his capacity of the CGS, through the Chief, sector for Operations and Staff Affairs. Due to the fact that he attended Staff Meetings (both in peace and at war), he will say that as an experience operations officer he had immediately proceeded, for the sake of efficiency and efficacy, to record tasks for the Department and to implement them, and has not waited for a special order to do that. He explains that his work mostly related to those tasks which were assigned by General Ojdanic at evening meetings of Supreme Command Staff, during the aggression.

16. The witness will testify to say that General Ojdanic was known for his habit to always issue concrete and clear orders, with clearly defined time periods and persons to carry them out.

17. The witness will say that he remembers more cases, before the aggression started and even while it was on, that General Ojdanic has personally invited him and gave him assignments to make specific document, orders, plans, reports and similar. Most often this was explained by the urgency of an assignment and duties, or merely because of the

necessity General Ojdanic felt to provide better explanation about what and how he wanted the matters to be done.

18. He will also testify that General Ojdanic was known as a man of principles. It was exactly the same he has asked from his subordinates and closest associates. In such cases the witness would brief his first superior on the assignment - order he had received, or he would wait for the return of his superior, in cases when he was absent, and would brief him then.

Therefore, he never had any problems on that matter. General Ojdanic had also briefed his superior on the matter, on the first possible occasion. The witness will also say that his cooperation with the Chief of Sector for Operations and Staff Affairs was excellent, and that he was his deputy by formation.

19. The witness will continue to say that he was aware that at the end of April 1999 General Ojdanic had received a letter from the then Chief Prosecutor of the Hague Tribunal Mrs. Louise Arbour and he also knew what General Ojdanic had done in connection with that letter.

20. The witness will speak about his knowledge concerning all plans for: readiness, alert, deployment and those of special purpose (irrespective of the fact whether he made them, participated in their making or only in their updating in line with current developments, or organized their usage and keeping). He will testify that he was aware of the plans of deployment of all strategic groups.

21. The witness will testify to say that the VJ and the GS VJ never had any plan, order or any other similar documents, which contained plans, instigated, ordered, in any other way aided, or supported terror aimed at Kosovo Albanian population in K&M. Those plans could never have existed without his knowing about them. The witness will say what he knew about the way of making and keeping of Deployment Plans.

22. He will also testify to say that according to his knowledge General Ojdanic, as CGS VJ, has never issued an order which could be interpreted to breach the law, customs of warfare, or of provisions of International Humanitarian Law, the breach of rules, instructions or prescribed procedures.

23. The witness will also explain the command system of VJ. He will provide explanation on reporting along the chain of command, by way of regular or special operative daily reports by the beginning of aggression, that is, by way of combat reports from the beginning of aggression, along the line of operative centers of the GS VJ.

24. The witness will continue to say that the First (Operations) Department enabled uninterrupted and continuous work of the Operations Centre of the Supreme Command Staff with OCs of all subordinated commands and units throughout the aggression. He will continue to explain that the system of reporting has been in place at all times, in peace and during the aggression.

He will testify to say that some types of communications were interrupted for short periods during the aggression, especially those at lower command levels.

25. He will say that he knew that in addition to the prescribed one, by orders of the Supreme Command Staff a reporting system was developed in full, which was implemented in practice. He will continue to say that GS and Supreme Command Staff, that is, its Chief could have known only the facts they had received, either through regular or special reports.

26. He will testify to say that during the aggression those Operative daily reports - combat reports were examined on the level of teams and sectors at the Operations Centre - in the Operations Room by the operative team on duty, by all assistants of the CGS and by Chiefs of Independent Departments. The witness will continue to say that as far as the Operations Department was concerned, the duty to examine those reports also lied in the domain of the Department Chief, chiefs of sections, Chief of Operations Centre and of some desk officers.

27. The witness will describe further work based on written reports (telegrams) sent by commands of all strategic groups and how the Operations Centre and its Operative Duty Team each night produced and sent combat reports to the Chief, Supreme Command Staff by 06:00, to his deputy, some assistants and chiefs of independent departments. He will also explain that the Office, Chief, Supreme Command Staff, acting through the Military Office of the FRY President has also submitted daily reports.

28. The witness will talk about the information he acquired from combat reports made by strategic groups, and especially from reports of the 3rd Army Command, which he then examined on daily basis, on individual cases of criminal offences committed by the military personnel.

29. He will testify to say that he knows that on 25th March 1999 a mobilization was ordered followed by forming of military judicial elements and that they were formed and started with work already on 26th March 1999 and that after 2-3 days a control was performed to examine their work and to provide them with necessary assistance by the Chief of Legal Department of the Supreme Command Staff.

30. He will also testify to say that Chief, Supreme Command Staff paid special attention to the receipt, training and assigning of volunteers to the units. It was done in line with the Law and regulations. He insisted that volunteers were examined in terms of their health and psycho-physical condition, that they were properly accepted, prepared, trained and organized sending to respective units, dispersed employment in lower units.

31. The witness will continue to say that according to his knowledge those volunteers, after they have been received, processed and trained in the centers were organized to go to specific units, were they were accepted and prepared for sending to lower units. Just after the outbreak of war, the Sector for Education and Training has got an assignment and accepted the obligation to organize the system of monitoring and training of volunteers, which decreased the problems that were recorded at the beginning of that process. All volunteers who were received in that way were included in the system, and were placed under the responsibility of commands in their respective units and areas of responsibility (the Pristina Corps and brigade commands). They were treated absolutely the same as other soldiers.

32. The witness will testify to tell about his experience from the training in the field of IHL at the end of 1998 and in the first half of 1999, and during the time of aggression. He will continue to explain that from the level of GS - Supreme Command Staff, norms were put in place to regulate all issues relative to the knowledge of and observance of the Geneva Convention and of the International War Law through seminars at the highest level.

33. He will testify to say that Chief, Supreme Command Staff paid special attention to the implementation of the International Humanitarian War Law.

He will explain all he knows about those orders, warnings, printed reminders for officers and separate ones for soldiers, which were issued and directed to units during the aggression. The reminder for soldiers was made by the Operations Department and distributed at the order of General Ojdanic.

34. This witness will testify that General Ojdanic insisted and gave orders that for the sake of avoiding any misunderstanding, and eliminating any accidents in that area a document on preventive action of officers to avoid any and all criminal offences in their units should be distributed to all units together with a reminder on the procedure to be followed by military commanders, commands and other bodies in case criminal offences are committed.

35. He will also testify to say that he knew that the GS VJ, as the top professional staff body for the preparation and deployment of the Army in peace and at war was regularly following the situation in the surrounding territories, and especially in K&M and in connection with K&M. He will continue to explain that with the growing threat of aggression, the CGS VJ, acting at the request of the 3rd Army Command and as proposed by the GS VJ elements issued decisions to reinforce the 3rd Army and the Pristina Corps by taking corresponding forces from the 1st and 2nd Army and bringing them to the rims of K&M, and later to the territory of K&M. All those orders were made and sent by the Operations Department after it has coordinated them with other departments and sectors of the GS VJ.

36. The witness will provide evidence on the method of work at the Sector and at the Operations Department, in peace and at war; namely, he will say that a team work was valued with full respect for all associates as professionals who were involved in specific tasks. It was General Ojdanic who especially insisted on this aspect. The witness will also describe the procedure followed by the CGS when he allocated tasks for the preparation of an official document - order.

37. The witness is informed and he will testify that on 18th April 1999 and acting in line with art. 17 of the Law on Defence, President Milosevic had issued an order to assign the Ministry of Interior elements and units within VJ unit commands in the zone of combat operations for the sake of execution of a specific task. This order was followed by a Chief, Supreme Command Staff order, which has never been implemented. He will also continue to say that the Ministry of Interior was not assigned within VJ.

The GS VJ did not have any effective control over the Ministry of Interior.

He will also speak to confirm that he has not issued any orders to the Ministry of Interior, that he has not received any reports from them and that no exchange of representatives has taken place.

38. The witness will testify to say that it was at the end of May 1999 the Chief, Supreme Command Staff ordered an analysis to be made regarding realization of requests made by the 3rd Army Command. All sectors and independent departments made the analysis of those requests relative to their own scopes of activities. The witness will testify that the Operations Department compiled all those analyses into one and sent the report to the 3rd Army Command at the beginning of June 1999.

39. The witness will testify that the CGS VJ, General Ojdanic, was an extremely hard-working man. He used to work a lot, read and write a lot, do some checking on his own, issue orders, engage in consultations, asked for explanations. He will give a description of his working day which lasted from morning till late in the night.

40. The witness will say how he knew that General Ojdanic had an intuition; he predicted that an aggression would be launched against our country.

There were numerous indications for that. The hints of it were reflected in timely issued orders for dislocation of war material reserves, clearing of warehouses, abandoning military barracks and commands and going out on the ground, performed operations deployment, units' manning, taking positions and areas along the avenues of possible deployment, undertaking measures of tactical and operative camouflage, timely increase of combat preparedness, making fortifications and placing obstacles and daily increase of preparations for countering NATO aggression.

41. The witness will testify to say that General Ojdanic trusted his associates and especially his assistants. He absolutely relied upon them; he stimulated them to do everything that was in their competence. He will also explain that General Ojdanic insisted that everyone may and should propose even those measures, activities and procedures which do exceed their scope of responsibility, but the realization of which would be relevant and of importance. This attitude has enabled optimum realization of all tasks.

And to add, General Ojdanic is a commander and a man of principles. He has extremely appreciated and honoured the principles of a single command and of subordination, responsibility, honesty, sincerity, coordination, readiness for cooperation, dedication and commitment to one's work. He will add to say that the Chief, Supreme Command Staff has never issued direct commands to the corps commanders, but instead to the commanders of strategic groups.

42. He will testify to say that the GS - Supreme Command Staff and General Ojdanic paid special attention to the control function. The witness will testify to say that General Ojdanic had great belief in people and that he appreciated people, appreciated their reports and that he had regularly sent control teams to subordinated units. For all controls there are orders, reports on completed control, and when necessary an order for elimination of weaknesses with exactly defined time periods and persons in charge; this was most often done at the First Department, and was supervised by this witness.

43. The witness will testify to say that he knew that the Chief of General Staff, the Chief of the Supreme Command Staff sent control teams and Main Inspection, even at the time of heaviest bombing to the units, and especially to the 3rd Army, the Pristina Corps and the 2nd Army to establish the true status there. The teams were lead by his deputy, his assistants, chiefs of sectors and departments in the Supreme Command Staff. Almost all those orders for control were produced at the First Department.

44. He will testify that before the war and during aggression the subordinated commands in their operative and combat reports reported on a numerous teams, controls that had been sent by the superior commands or about those teams they had sent to control of their subordinated units. He will testify that each command level had to report in its daily operative or combat report that control was in its units from the superior command. The same was done when some command would send control to its subordinated units.

45. The witness will speak about his knowledge that at the General Staff - Supreme Command Staff there has never been any mention of some war option. Everyone and especially General Ojdanic advocated resolution of problems in K&M in a peaceful manner.

46. The witness will testify to say that he has known General Ojdanic for a long time and that he has known him well; in addition, during the time covered by the indictment he was constantly and directly working with him, he was constantly in his vicinity and he will testify to say that everything he has done or ordered was in line with the Constitution, laws, bylaws, regulations, combat rules and orders, international humanitarian and war laws, as well as in line with instructions and rules of combat deployment of VJ units.
